

"SEND PARENTS TO JAIL," HIS PLEA

Judge Willis Brown Says This Would Stop Criminals Manufacture.

MOTHERS MUCH BLAMED.

IN THE COURSE OF AN INTERESTING ADDRESS THE FAMOUS JUDGE ALSO DEALS OUT SOME TEMPERANCE IDEAS.

"Send the mothers and fathers of bad boys and girls to jail. The way to stop the manufacture of criminals is to punish any person who contributes to the dependency of a child by any act of commission or omission."

The formula of a corrective for society was presented by Willis Brown, former judge of the juvenile court in Salt Lake City, Utah, in an address to 300 Cook county school teachers at the association auditorium on "The Making of American Citizens."

"Men and women don't own their children," continued Mr. Brown. "They own their horse or their dog, but they do not own their children. They say I am heartless or hard-hearted when I send a mother to jail for not properly caring for her son or her daughter."

"Women who will do nothing to prevent their children from committing infractions of the law, come into court and faint over the judge's bench when it is suggested that their boys have done wrong, but they always come with their smelling salts."

Puts Blame on Parents.

"When I point to the mother or the father of a wayward girl as the cause for her error, I am told that I am overstepping all rules of jurisprudence and economical science. They refer to the poverty in the home and the 'sweet-shop' conditions as the reason for the failure of the child to keep on the right path. What I blame is the drunken father, the careless mother and the saloon."

"The saloon should go, just as should the cigarette and mine pie, not because of themselves, but because they are contaminating young children. Let a man go into his cellar or his kitchen and guzzle all the whiskey he wants, but close the damnable place which takes all or the greater part of his earnings each week."

In speaking of the juvenile codes which have been established in many states in the union, Mr. Brown said that there had been too much compromise, that laws had been enacted to be mildly corrective or penal rather than preventive.

OVER EMBANKMENT WENT INTERURBAN

Car Broke Through Ice and Passengers Were Rescued.

Salon, O., Jan. 28.—A limited interurban car on the Youngstown & Ohio Electric railway jumped the track three miles east of here yesterday afternoon and plunged down a thirty-foot embankment. Fifteen passengers of the twenty-five aboard were injured but none fatally.

The car in its plunge struck a trolley pole and the vestibule was torn entirely off. Motorman Eugene Mugay of Leetonia, O., was badly hurt, but will recover.

The car continued to the bottom of the embankment and broke through the ice into four feet of water. The passengers were rescued through the windows by farmers who saw the accident.

MEMORIAL READ FOR E. B. NEWMAN

Presented to Members of the Wayne County Bar This Morning.

STUDY MAKES STATEMENT.

SAID THAT HE DOES NOT BELIEVE IN MEMORIALS TO DECEASED MEMBERS OF THE BAR—LAUDED NEWMAN HOWEVER.

A memorial of the late E. B. Newman, the oldest member of the Wayne county bar, who died last week, was presented this morning by a special committee, composed of T. R. Jessup, T. J. Study and A. R. Peckmaster, and after being read by Mr. Jessup, the memorial was concurred in by all members of the bar present and it was ordered spread on the records and a copy forwarded to the widow.

In the memorial, Mr. Newman was described as a thoroughly honest and conscientious man, beloved by everyone who knew him. He moved to Milton when ten years of age. When a young man he taught school in Wayne and Henry counties and in 1857 was admitted to the Wayne county bar. During the war of the rebellion, Mr. Newman rendered great service to his state by most efficient work as a member of the state legislature.

After the reading of the memorial, Mr. Study said that it was a great pleasure to him to assist in drawing up a memorial to E. B. Newman and to speak in praise of him. He stated that as a rule he did not believe in the practice of lauding members of the bar after their death, because it did them no good and oftentimes undeserved praise was given them. "The most honest man, a virtue some attorneys do not possess, that I ever knew," was how Mr. Study described Mr. Newman. Mr. Study stated that the deceased was never a great lawyer, but that he was always a good one and had many striking and praiseworthy characteristics. Judge H. C. Fox, Henry T. Johnson and T. R. Jessup also spoke in praise of Mr. Newman.

SEN. BEVERIDGE FAILS

Two of His Pet Measures Are Dead and Third Listed For Slaughter.

ANTI-INJUNCTION BILL.

Washington, Jan. 28.—Senator Beveridge is not having good luck with his bills at this session of congress. Two of his pet measures are dead, and a third has encountered so much opposition, as shown by recent developments, as to leave no doubt that it is marked for an early interment in the congressional graveyard.

His proposition to require packers to place the date of packing on their canned goods and to pay the cost of inspection are so strongly antagonized in the committees on agriculture as to cause the champion of those reforms to lose hope of favorable action. His tariff commission bill on which he will address the senate Feb. 5, is likewise doomed, as is his child labor measure.

Yesterday Senator Beveridge appeared in a new role as the advocate of the anti-injunction legislation. He introduced a bill, which he indicates, was prepared at the request of President Roosevelt. It is as follows:

"Be it enacted, That no temporary injunctions or temporary restraining orders shall be issued by any court of the United States in controversies between employers and employees without notice, and all such temporary injunctions and temporary restraining orders shall be heard by the court issuing the same with a reasonable time, not to exceed seven days from the date when said temporary injunction or temporary restraining order is issued. Provided that said court, upon agreement of parties, or at the application of the defendant, may postpone said hearing to a later date than said seven days, in the discretion of the court; provided further that nothing herein contained shall be held to authorize the issuing of a restraining order or an injunction in any case in which the same is not authorized by existing law."

The American Federation of Labor already has got behind the anti-injunction bill of Representative Pearre of Maryland, which has none of the features of the Beveridge bill.

BRANCH IS IN RACE

Speaker of the Indiana House Wants to Be Lieutenant Governor.

ANNOUNCEMENT IS ISSUED.

Martinsville, Ind., Jan. 28.—Emmet F. Branch, speaker of the Indiana House of Representatives, yesterday made formal announcement of his candidacy for lieutenant governor. Mr. Branch has been discussed some time as a candidate for congressman from the Fifth district, or as a candidate for the office which he now seeks.

Mr. Branch's decision to enter the race for the lieutenant governorship followed many conferences and much advice from his friends and those who had friends whom they were pushing for one of the positions.

Mr. Branch's ambition to be lieutenant governor of Indiana was born while he was speaker of the house of representatives in the last session. Friends of the speaker at that time encouraged him to make the race for the position to which he now aspires.
