

# CORTELYOU TELLS SENATE OF HIS ACTION IN PANIC

Makes Explanation and Statement of Financial Conditions Which Necessitated Action of Department.

## NO CRITICISM FOR SALE OF SECURITIES HE SAYS.

This Was Done to Prevent the Impending and Grave Financial Disaster—Statement Was Voluminous.

Washington, Jan. 29.—Secretary Cortelyou's reply to the senate resolution calling for a statement in regard to the department's action during the financial crisis, was presented to the senate today. After an elaborate statement of the financial conditions the report says: "If new legislation don't relieve the secretary of the treasury from the obligation of guardianship over the money market, his ability to relieve the market by a large deposit of public funds during the autumn when the demand is the greatest, must be kept constantly in view. No criticism can be made, he said, against the policy of the sale of securities for the purpose of preventing grave financial disaster."
