APPRaisERS NAMED

Appraisers of the stock of the Rost & Marshall company, formerly proprietors of the Big Store, have been appointed. It has been reported currently that the stock of the company, which has been placed in involuntary bankruptcy, is valued at \$30,000. It is not believed the stock will show an actual value of more than one third that sum. One of the attorneys in the matter stated today he does not expect the appraisers will value it at more than \$6,000. William Goodwin, of New Castle, and Will Loehr and Fred Krone, of this city, all experienced clothing and men's furnishings dealers, have been named appraisers. Henry T. Burns has been appointed trustee in bankruptcy.

In the bankruptcy court held here yesterday Clay Hunt, referee, granted the petition of Ray Shively for an order to sell the stock of the defunct firm at private sale to be valid up to and including April 22. If the stock were not disposed of at private sale the petition asked that it be disposed of at public auction either in bulk or by parcel on the following day. The petition will be heard April 11 at New Castle.
