FRIENDS IN MERGER

All Foreign Missionary Work
Of the Church Under
One Head.

A CONFERENCE IS HELD.

At an all-day conference of about seventy-five pastors and missionary workers from the Friends' Churches over the state and the Indiana and the Western Yearly Meetings of the Friends' Church, held yesterday in the First Friends' church, Thirteenth and Alabama streets in Indianapolis, a movement was started for the merger of all the foreign missionary work of the Friends' Church in Indiana, with that of all the other states under the control of the American Friends' Board of Foreign Missions.

The principal address was delivered by the Rev. C. E. Tebbetts of this city, general secretary of the American Friends Board of Foreign Missions. Members of the American Friends' Board of Foreign Missions were present from New York, Kansas and Ohio, in addition to the members representing the Indiana and the Western Friends' Yearly Meetings. The executive committee of the board held a closed session last night in the pastor's study at the First Church for a thorough discussion of the problems which greet the worker for foreign missions. The conference, which has been on for the last two days, closed with the session last night.

TEDDY NOT HEADED

Counsel on Naval Increase
Was All for Naught
It Seems.

ONLY TWO BATTLESHIPS.

Washington, D. C., April 9.—President Roosevelt's recommendation for increasing the navy were partially ignored by the house committee on Naval Affairs, which has reported the naval appropriation bill. Instead of making provision for four battle ships of the first class, as urged by the president, the bill carries appropriation for only two.

The committee also disregarded the administration's recommendation with respect to submarine torpedo boats, providing for eight instead of only four, as suggested. When Representative Lilly, of Connecticut, demanded his investigation of the methods employed by the Holland company in securing the incorporation of this item in the bill, it was thought the committee would adhere to the administration program, but it was not swayed from its original purpose.

WHIP WATSON USES HIS TRUSTY FLAIL

Beats the Democrats Into
Line by Diplomatic
House Rule.

CANNOT HINDER NOW.

PROGRAM OF BUSINESS HAS
BEEN SPECIFICALLY SET DOWN
AND CONGRESSMAN MUST
ABIDE BY IT.

Washington, April 9.—Congressman James E. Watson is the author of the rule by which the republican majority in the house of representatives put a crimp in the democratic filibusters who have been twisting the republican elephant's tail and blocking business in the house.

When the "whip" returned from Indiana he found that the democrats had sewed up the house and were having their own way. He drafted a rule which he thought would handle the democratic brethren and showed it to Dalzell and Bayne of the committee on rules. In every syllable of the rule there was evidence of the mailed fist.

"This rule is simply awful, Jim," said Dalzell.

"Well, we have to deal with an awful situation," replied Watson. The republicans got a strangle hold on the democrats and struck them in the solar plexus with Watson's rule. When the rule had been read the democrats gasped for breath, then proceeded to get mad and do volcanic stunts.

According to old timers the rule is a rare work of art. It provides for the entire procedure of the house from Wednesday until Monday afternoon. It stipulates that adjournment shall be had without any roll call and states on what days certain pending bills shall be considered without roll calls. It further provides that the house shall convene every morning at 11:30 o'clock and fixes the hour of adjournment for each day.

REMAINS TAKEN UP AFTER 136 YEARS

Swedenborg to Be Reburied on
Native Soil.

London, April 9.—After reposing in London for 136 years, the remains of Emanuel Swedenborg, the famous mystic and writer, will soon be on their way to Sweden for burial in their native soil. The Swedish government formally request the exhumation and surrender of the body, and, on the British government assenting, authorized Count Wrangel, the Swedish minister in London, to arrange the details.

WAR DOGS PREPARE

May Be Unleashed to Spring
At Throat of Venezuela.

MOBILIZATION IS PLANNED.

Chicago, April 9.—A dispatch from Washington, D. C., says:

Plans are being elaborated in detail for the mobilization of a joint military and naval force in Venezuelan waters as soon as possible after President Roosevelt obtains congressional sanction to resort to force against Castro.

It may not be deemed necessary by the administration to make this martial demonstration, but the war and navy departments are both mapping out a tentative military movement.

The whole military situation is now under consideration by the general staff of the army and the general board of the navy by a direct order from the president upon Secretary Root's recommendation for preparedness to back up eventualities with a show of arms.

President Roosevelt cannot constitutionally declare war against Venezuela. Legislative authority would be required for such a campaign and the present preparation of plans, it is understood, will be merely in accord with the policy of mapping out campaigns for possible emergencies.

Directions given in the present instance are, however, the most explicit made since the army and navy were ordered to prepare for participation in the international relief column against Peking during the Boxer troubles. They are being guarded closely and transmitted verbally from bureau to bureau.

INVENT NOVEL NIGHT SIGNAL

Marine Calculates It to Be a Success.

Washington, April 9.—First Lieut. Fred A. Ramsey, Marine Corps, on duty at the Puget Sound Barracks, has applied for a patent on a night signaling device to be used on board ship or by land parties. The device is calculated to take the place of the present system of night signaling by torches and by searchlights. Lieut. Ramsey declares that his device is more reliable, will be effective at a greater distance, and will work faster than the present systems. His apparatus consists of two powerful lights, one red and the other white. The signaling is done by changing the position and combination of these lights. This is managed from a keyboard similar to that on a typewriter, so that all the operator has to do to flash any letter of the alphabet is to press the proper key. The entire apparatus weighs little and can easily be carried about on land.

NINTH INTERNATIONAL GEOGRAPHICAL CONGRESS

Will Be Held in Geneva This Year.

Geneva, Switzerland, April 9.—The Ninth International Geographical congress will be held at Geneva from July 27th to August 6th. The last place of assembly was in the United States, and it is nine years since the geographers met in Europe at Berlin, 1899. The representative character of the congress is already assured.

SCHOOL OF COMMERCE.

It Will Be Established at Harvard College.

Cambridge, Mass., April 9.—Plans for the school of commerce to be established in connection with the Harvard graduate school of arts and sciences have been completed, and are awaiting the approval of the governing boards.
