MARRIED IN TWO DAYS; DIVORCE IN FOUR WEEKS

Romance of Rush County Couple "Squelched."

Rushville, Ind., April 29.—Jacob Wissing, age fifty-three, has begun proceedings for divorce from his wife, a bride of about four weeks. Wissing's first wife died two years ago, and being in ill health for the last few months, as advertised recently for a nurse-keeper, Mrs. Josephine Reinhart, of Streator, Ill., in response to the advertisement, came to accept the position and, apparently, it was a case of love at first sight, for the couple married two days after they met. The bride was fifty-three years of age.

Three days after the marriage Wissing became ill and was confined to his bed for over a week. His wife nursed him through his illness and when he had regained his health she declared she was sorry she had married him and left for her home in Illinois.

Wissing is one of the largest land owners in Ripley township and owns a farm of over 200 acres. He charges desertion in his complaint.

The funeral of Major Harold C. McGrew took place Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in Indianapolis. The body, escorted by Company C, Indiana National Guard, was taken to St. Paul's Episcopal church. There it was received by representatives of the United Spanish War Veterans, the Loyal Legion, Sons of Veterans and a detail from Battleg A. Those escorting the body to North street, where it was taken for Crown Hill cemetery.

The services at the church were conducted by the Rev. Lewis Brown. The pallbearers were Gen. W. J. McRae, Gen. George W. P. Welch, Col. Russell S. Charlson, Major Charles A. Garrard, Charles A. Bookwinkel, Capt. Paul Comstock, of Richmond, and Capt. William E. English, the last named officially representing Commander-in-Chief, U.S. of Veterans, of the United Spanish War Veterans.
