## HAS BECOME REFORMED.

Omaha, August 1.—Pat Crowe, champion American kidnapper, has quit the game. He couldn't be induced to kidnap another child for a king's ransom. And he hasn't the respect for kidnappers he once had.

"A little child shall lead them," it is written in the scriptures.

It was a little child that led Pat; his own baby born seven months old, laughing, cooing bundle of affection.

"I wouldn't take a million dollars for this little fellow," Pat declared, joggling the baby on his knee. "He's a kid right. Feel that grip. Look at that laugh. Money? Couldn't buy him."

"But if someone happens to—kidnap him?"

The lines about his mouth grew firm and hard, the gray eyes lit with an almost glitter.

"That's better not," said Pat, grimly. "That was a pretty hot shot," he said a moment later. "But say, and there was almost appeal in his voice, 'you see, I didn't know. I had never had a kid. ## FIGHT PROGRESSING

Shippers Battle Against Proposed Increased Freight Rates Determined.

## A NEW STEP IS TAKEN.

Chicago, Ill., August 1.—The fight against the proposed advance of railroad rates, which centers in this city, progressed another step at the conference of shippers, and is being conducted with dignity, and every amicable effort to change the decision of the railroad executives, before more vigorous tactics are employed, is being made. Letters commending the dispassionate letter to President

Roosevelt, sent by the shippers, asking his intervention, and the resolutions adopted by the shippers at their meeting in the offices of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, have been received from many quarters. The tolerance of the resolutions and the proposal that railroad executives hold another meeting with the shippers were especially approved, the wording of the resolutions having included the following: "The shippers represented by this conference now propose to the carriers that the carriers submit to the interstate commerce commission the propriety and reasonableness of the proposed increase and that such increase be held in abeyance until that tribunal has passed upon the question."
