VENTILATION ON NEW FRUIT BOATS

System Which Keeps State Rooms Comfortable During the Whole Year.

MANY NOVEL FEATURES.

ANY TEMPERATURE DESIRED BY PASSENGER MAY BE OBTAINED BY TURNING DIAL IN HIS STATE-ROOM.

New York, Sept. 5.—To create passengers a constant supply of cool, fresh air, four new vessels of the United Fruit company have been equipped with a ventilating system that makes the state rooms as comfortable as the front piazza of a Bar Harbor hotel. A great refrigerating plant, connecting with a system of air ducts and fans, furnishes an ever ready supply of cold air to all parts of the ships.

In each stateroom of the Fruit company's new boats there is a dial on which different temperatures are designated. If a temperature of 60 degrees is wanted the hand on the dial is turned to that number, and enough cold air supplied to bring the temperature there and automatically keep it there. A novel feature of the ventilating system are the turbine fans of the Sirocco type, used in all the principal navies and on board of the newest private yachts and ocean liners. One of these turbine fans only 20 inches in diameter, will supply 28,000 cubic feet of air per minute.

The new steamer Carthage, just in commission, and now running between New Orleans and Colon, is equipped with the new temperature-controlling device, and the Parismine, which will go into commission at the end of this month, and the Heredia, which is to make her maiden trip in October, are having the new apparatus installed.

The vessels are especially designed for carrying passengers in a tropical climate, and all the accommodations for passengers have openings on deck. They are said to be the finest vessels in the Caribbean.

PRESIDENT DIAZ BOUND TO RETIRE

Makes Position Plain in Statement Printed in a New York Magazine.

MUTINIES UNIMPORTANT.

SOUND NATIONAL JUDGMENT OF MEXICAN PEOPLE HAS INSPIRED THEM WITH SELF-CONFIDENCE.

Should President Diaz retire from the presidency of the Mexican republic? This, strangely enough, has been made the principal topic of discussion in Mexico by the publication of an interview with General Diaz in a New York Magazine. The article was translated and published throughout the republic. In it the president said: "No matter what my friends and supporters say, I retire when my present term of office ends, and I shall not serve again. I shall be eighty years old then."

Among the many comments on this declaration none is more significant than that of Gen. Bernardo Reyes, governor of Nuevo Leon, who is quoted as follows by Congressman Heriberto Barron, editor of La Republica: "The welfare of Mexico," General Reyes said, "still requires the continuance of General Diaz in the presidency, and such is in my opinion the general feeling of the nation."

"When we can be under the direction of General Diaz at the time most necessary in order that he may complete his work, have we to lose his guiding hand, knowing, as we all know, that on the announcement of public opinion begging him to continue ruling over the destinies of the nation, he will respect the supplications of his people?"

"Are we going to allow this prudent and wise statesman to retire when, having built up a strong and rich nation, he can bequeath it to us, democratic, complete and firmly consolidated?"

"Are we going to permit the skilful steersman to leave the ship after he has conducted it in safety over a turbulent ocean, and when we are in sight of the desired port?"

"No, friend Barron, the duty of every loyal Mexican consists in convincing General Diaz that he ought to accept a new nomination, and we, being under this obligation must fulfill it."

"And do you believe that the riots lately occurring at Viesca and other border points have had any importance, and express the sentiment of any political party or faction?" I asked Governor Reyes.

"It is well known," he said, "not only in Mexico, but in all the world—every nation with which we are cultivating friendly relations have done us justice—that such mutinies had no importance whatever. They were considered as mere acts of brigandage, the work of bad Mexicans who, not being able to live in Mexico without being persecuted by the courts, fled to foreign countries, where they have entered upon the infamous industry of conspiracy against their government. United by evil doers who frequent the frontiers in order to escape easily from the clutches of justice, they have prepared armed outbreaks and attacks fit for highway robbers and which shall never attain a political importance."

DEER IN M. RR. TIME

Tired of Monotony of Park And Soon Found Excitement.

WAS CHASED BY DOGS.

Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 5.—Tired of its monotonous and easy existence in the fields outside of this city, the deer that has been making its home in Wildwood park for several weeks entered the city.

It was first seen on Maclay street, but when pursued by two large black dogs it took to the river. The excited animal headed for Independence island with the dogs at its heels.

A crowd of people witnessed the chase. The deer brought its remarkable swimming powers into play, outdistanced the yelping pair of hounds, and finally landed safely on the island.

Several moments later the dogs reached the island also and the deer struck out for Hargess island.

After swimming about the dogs gave up the chase turning to the city banks. The deer is now running at large over the island opposite the city.

NEW STEEL ROLLED

Fifty Tons of Vadium Rolled Successfully in This Country.

OF USE IN STEAM BOILERS.

Coatesville, Pa., Sept. 5.—Fifty tons of Vadium steel has been rolled successfully at Worth Bros' steel plant. Vadium has been discovered in South Africa and is under the control of the American Vadium company, who furnished the Coatesville firm with the necessary quantity for all the tests so far made.

The idea of the makers of the new steel is to use it for the construction of steam boilers, especially locomotives. Steel plate now used tests 60,000 pounds to the square inch, while the Vadium steel will test to 80,000. The harder the steel, less tensile strength it has, and by the use of Vadium strength is added with brittleness.

It is said that the new steel will wear longer and boilers can be made of lighter plate and have the same durability. Vadium in steel does not change its appearance.

DANCING OSTRICHES

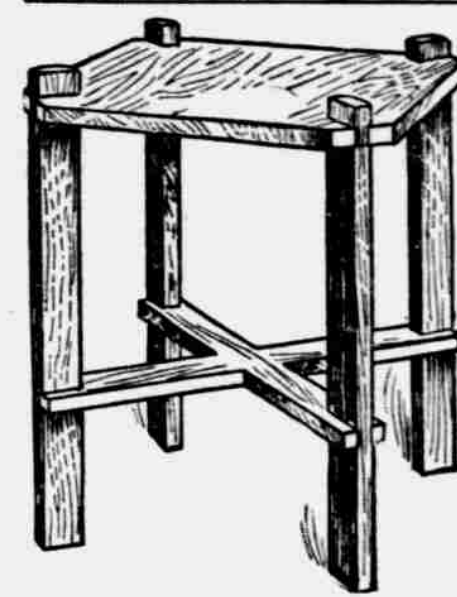
Peculiar Gyration Are a Form Of Instinct for Protection.

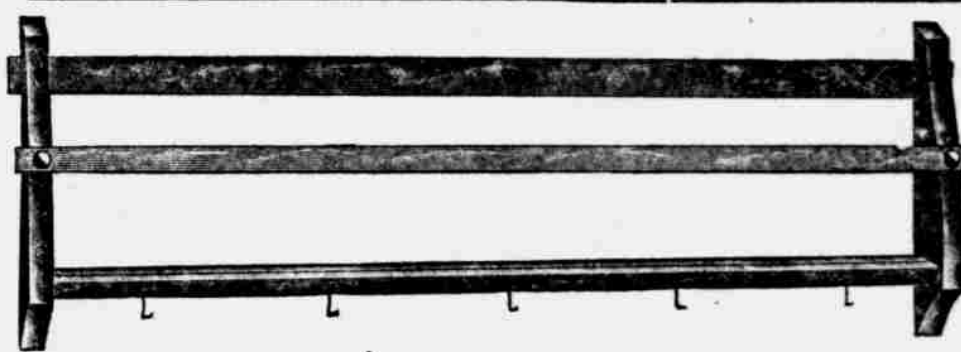
