ASSAULTED WOMAN

**Frank Lay Being Prosecuted
This Afternoon at
Hagerstown.
HE RECEIVES INJURIES.**

In the court of Justice, Carmon sells at Hagerstown this afternoon, the case of the state vs. Frank Lay is being heard. Lay is defended by Shiveley and Shiveley of this city. The defendant is charged with assault and battery upon Mrs. Moses Kever. The trouble is the result of an episode of last Saturday evening. Mrs. Kever went to the restaurant operated by Lay and it is said made insulting remarks. She was ordered away and refused to go. Thereupon Lay put her out and pushed her on the sidewalk and away from the front of his place of residence. It is claimed he did not abuse her. Moses Kever saw the incident from the opposite side of the street and hurled a rock at Lay who put up his hand to protect his face and suffered a fracture of the hand. Kever was arrested and fined for assault and battery upon Lay.

WILD SCENE WHEN
ITALIAN IS ACQUITTED

Victim of Murder Charge Hugged by His Fellows.

Marion, Ind., Oct. 2.—When the jury acquitted Pasquale Trotta, charged with the murder of Erigo Quaranto, wild scenes were witnessed in the court room. Thirty Italian friends of Trotta shouted and applauded, clasping Trotta in their arms and kissing him. Trotta kissed the jurors on the hands. Self defense was claimed and sustained. The killing occurred in August.

JUDICIAL CLEMENCY
IS SHOWN MOYER

Colored Lad Accused of Assault Given Freedom.

Judicial clemency was shown Harry Mayes, colored, a minor by Judge Converse of the city court this morning. After having been in jail since September 13 for assault and battery upon his sister, the colored boy was ordered released by the court. When he was sent to jail the boy showed considerable malice for the court. With the prospect of release before him this morning, this changed. He said he had believed everybody was against him and he might as well say whatever he chose. The judge in private conversation showed the boy where his error lay. At the time of his hearing before the court, Mayes refused to make any statement in his own behalf except to say he was not guilty as charged. His mother and sister said he had mistreated them and had threatened the life of his sister when the police were called. This morning Mayes showed the judge a scar on his breast, which he said was made when his mother bit him in the scarp. The boy was asked why he did not make this statement in court and said he did not want to have things in the newspapers about his mother and sister. The judge seemed greatly surprised by the attitude of the court. He said hereafter if his mother or sister try to pick a quarrel with him, he will leave them alone and make no effort to strike back.
