## FOUNDERS WEEK IN PHILADELPHIA

Pretty Ceremonies Surround  
Opening of Celebration.

Philadelphia, Oct. 3.—Founders' week was officially begun this evening at 8 o'clock with the lighting of twenty-eight commemorative lamps surrounding the City Hall.

At that time in the presence of Mayor Reuburn, the presidents of both branches of the city council, the department of directors and other city officials, twenty-eight little school girls dressed in white and wearing sashes of the city's colors, headed by James Haslett, Jr., son of the president of Select Council, touched each lamp with a magic wand, causing it to burst forth into light.

At five minutes of eight o'clock the children left the mayor's office and headed by a band and six trumpeters, marched to the north entrance of the City Hall for the first commemorative lamp to be dedicated.

At the moment the lamp burst into illumination the band played and the school children sang national airs. It was a pretty ceremony and an appropriate one for the opening of the great founders' week celebration.

Major General Frederick D. Grant, U. S. A., commanding the department of the east, acted as chief marshal of the military parade.

## INTERNAL COMMERCE SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Bureau of Statistics Tells of  
Conditions.

Washington, Oct. 3.—Marked improvement is shown by the movement of internal commerce during the month of August, according to the report of the bureau of statistics of the department of commerce and labor, which was issued today. There is considerable heavy live stock movement compared with the preceding months of last year. An improvement is also shown in the freight car situation, practically all the associations showing increased traffic. Grain also shows heavier movements, and coal and lumber are still other commodities which indicate improved conditions.
