FULTON ALWAYS INTERESTING LAD

In Earlier Days in Life He Was Interested in Mechanics.

There are several anecdotes which relate to Robert Fulton's early interest in mechanics—the first steps of progress toward his later skill. In 1773, when he was eight years old, his mother, having previously taught him to read and write, sent him to a school kept by Mr. Caleb Johnson, a Quaker gentleman of pronounced Tory principles—so pronounced, in fact, that he narrowly escaped with his life during the Revolution. But Robert Fulton did not care for books, and he began at a very early age to search for problems never mastered and bound in print. This greatly distressed the Quaker teacher, who spared not the rod, and it is said that in administering such discipline on the hand of Robert Fulton he one day testily exclaimed, "There, that will make you do something!" to which Robert, with folded arms, replied, "Sir, I came to have something beaten into my brains and not into my knuckles." Without doubt he was a trial to his teacher.

He entered school one day very late, and when the master inquired the reason Robert, with frank interest, replied that he had been at Nicholas Miller's shop pounding out lead for a pencil. "It is the very best I ever had, sir," he affirmed as he displayed his product. The master, after an examination of the pencil, pronounced it excellent. When Robert's mother, who had been distressed by his lack of application to his studies, expressed to his teacher her pleasure at signs of improvement the latter confided to her that Robert had said to him, "My head is so full of original notions that there is no vacant chamber to stow away the contents of dusty books."

IS NO DISTRIBUTION

Peabody Educational Funds Held Up Awaiting Tennessee Appropriation.

THE ACT CAUSES SURPRISE

New York, Oct. 8.—Surprise was occasioned when the trustees of the Peabody educational fund met in this city and decided not to make a final distribution of the fund of \$2,500,000 left by George Peabody, of Massachusetts, in 1867 for educating the children of the southern states.

The donor provided that the income of the \$2,500,000 was to be used each year for educational purposes and that at the end of 30 years the trustees could distribute the money among such educational institutions as they should select. At a previous meeting of the trustees, among whom is President Roosevelt, it was practically decided to make the distribution.

In 1875 the trustees established the Peabody Normal college for teachers in Nashville, Tenn. It was intended to give \$1,000,000 outright to this college and to apportion the balance of the fund among others, but the Peabody Normal college had failed to provide \$750,000, as the conditions specify, in appropriations from the city of Nashville, Davidson county and the state of Tennessee. Joseph P. Choate and Richard Olney reported that the city and county have appropriated \$300,000, but the state has done nothing, though probably it will do something when the legislature meets in January. The distribution therefore will be postponed until after the legislature meets.

YOUNG EVANS TRIED

Son of Admiral a Victim of Court Martial at Manila.

INTOXICATION IS CHARGED.

Manila, Oct. 8.—The taking of testimony in the case of Lieutenant Frank T. Evans, of the battleship Louisiana, courtmartialled on a charge of absenting himself from his post while officer of the deck, disrespect to his superior officer and intoxication, has been concluded. There remains only the summing up by his counsel and it is expected that the proceedings will end today.

The chief contest by the defense was against the allegation of intoxication and in this respect the evidence is regarded as favorable to the accused officer. Lieutenant Evans admitted that he had left the deck while on watch, but presented evidence to show that he went below to quell a slight disturbance.
