Judge Fox Pointedly Asks the
Lawyers to Pay Attention
To Calling of Docket.

OLD CASES DISMISSED.

A NUMBER WILL COME UP FOR
TRIAL SOON—DISPOSITION IS
MADE OF OTHERS BEFORE
COURT.

Judge Fox, of the Wayne circuit
court, told the attorneys pointedly he
wanted them to pay attention to the
calling of the civil docket this morning.
As the result more than the ordinary
consideration was accorded this routine
work, and a number of chronic cases
that have been carried on the docket
from one term to another were stricken
off by consent.

No action was taken in the case of
the city of Richmond vs. Hill & Cook
on appeal. The defendants were ar-

was appealed to the circuit court.
