LATE PROTEST ON
GLEN ENCAMPMENT

Women of Criterion Club Think
Soldiers Should Have
Been Kept Out.

SAY PARK WAS DISFIGURED.

MANY CITIZENS WHO HAVE SEEN
THE PARK SINCE THE DEPART-
URE OF THE TENTH INFANTRY
DO NOT AGREE.

The women of the Criterion Literary
club met yesterday and all of them
took occasion to remark that they
thought it was not right for the city
to permit the soldiers of the Tenth Infan-
try to camp at Glen Miller Park.

They pointed out that the park was in
a poor condition since the troops had
left, owing to the great amount of rub-
bish and numerous sanitary trenches
which had been dug, had not been prop-
erly filled up. They also expressed
horror over the fact that the soldiers
and officers had been permitted to
drink beer and whisky at this camp.

The club did not by resolution ex-
press its opinion on the matter, as several
of the members pointed out, the club
had no authority to take action
on anything out of its sphere.

Many citizens of the city who have
seen the park since the departure of
the troops do not agree with the mem-
bers of the Criterion club that the
beauty of the park has been marred by
the presence of the soldiers. They insist
that what beauty that section of park
ever had has long since been de-
stroyed by the thousands of people who
annually attend the chautauqua and
to further state, the grounds are in as
good condition today as they were at
the close of the last chautauqua.

What trenches were dug by the sol-
diers were filled by them on leaving
and are now hardly noticeable. No sod
was placed over the trench coverings
because the grass was all killed by the
chautauqua crowds. The only evidence
remaining that the grounds were occu-
pied by the troops is a few chunks of
charred wood from the camp fires.
