WATSON SPEAKS AT HOME TONIGHT

Rush County People to Show Their Colors.

Rushville, Ind., Oct. 13.—Rush county people will have their first opportunity to show their colors for James E. Watson tonight. From all indications they are planning to take advantage of the opportunity. A special train will be run this evening from this city to Columbus, where Mr. Watson is on the campaign. It is thought that more than six hundred people will go from this city alone and a large number of farmers from the county will board the train at Homer and Manilla. Two bands and three drum corps will be on the train. A large delegation will come from Corynerville and board the train here.

The Canned Onion.

Half a freshly cut onion briskly rubbed over marked and spotted velvety will restore it to beauty if the velvety is directly afterward gently rubbed with a damp soft linen cloth and passed across a hot fatiron standing upright.

For dyeing speckled or faded cotton goods a pretty dark earth or light brown two red onions and a big handful of onion peels and boil them briskly for one hour in a quart of water, the strain and in the colored water thus obtained boil your goods slowly for three hours. Rinse in several waters.

Onion juice makes a strong adhesive for pasting paper, such as labels, etc. on tin or other metals.

The juice of fresh cut onion stems rubbed on insect stings and mosquito bites will when immediately applied prevent redness and swelling.

Onion juice mixed with good pure vinegar inhaled through the nose will stop nosebleed. Slices of fresh cut onion applied to the back of the neck help along the cure.

SECOND BALLOON

EXPLODES IN AIR

Spanish Balloon Mantana Rips At Height of Six Thousand Feet.

THE PASSENGERS ESCAPE.

AMERICAN AERIAL NAVIGATORS WHO HAD SERIOUS ACCIDENT SUNDAY HAVE RECOVERED FROM THEIR EXPERIENCE.

Berlin, Oct. 13.—An accident similar to the one that befell the American aeronauts in the international cup race Sunday is reported from Mestendorf, Province of Saxony, Prussia.

While the Spanish balloon Mantana was passing over the city at a height of 6,000 feet, the envelope ripped up. The balloon managed to land safely, and the occupants of the car were uninjured.

The following bulletins relative to the progress of the balloons which started Sunday in the international race for the James Gordon Bennett cup have been received:

Calau—The St. Louis was sighted moving in southwest direction.

Juterbog—L'Isle de France was sighted to the east.

Luneburg—The Condor was sighted apparently moving to the east.

Hamburg—The Condor was sighted, moving in the direction of the sea.

Salzwedel—The Dusseldorf was sighted to the westward.

Gransen—America II, was sighted.

Mimeberg—The Banshee was sighted.

Madenburg—The Zeppir landed here.

Bremen—Valencia landed.

Apparently all the balloons were caught in the same currents of air and all are describing virtually a complete circle.

A. Holland Forbes and Augustus C. Post, the two American aeronauts, who Sunday had such a narrow escape from death when their balloon, the Conqueror, burst in the air at an altitude of 4,000 feet, have completely recovered from the effects of their thrilling experience.

Although nothing definite has been established, the general opinion is that the accident was caused by the length of the appendix, which did not permit the gas to escape with sufficient rapidity as it expanded with ascent. This occurred in spite of the fact that the valve was completely open and the result was the concentration of a great pressure at the top of the balloon, which ended in a break. It was the purpose of the aeronauts, by this arrangement, to get greater lifting capacity.

The speaker stated when a schedule would put all the products of a trust on the free list, it would become a tariff of destruction. The labor questions and injunction issues were talked of by the Roosevelt policies, but it seems to me there must be something wrong, as the president refuses to recognize his heir.

In discussing the democratic platform as to bank deposits Mr. Low said its most serious objection is due to the fact it asks the country to place its entire financial system upon an untried plan. "But Mr. Bryan says 'look at Oklahoma,'" said the speaker. "Bryan points out that a bank in that state failed for \$24,000 and the depositors received their money and nobody was hurt. Now who would be willing to base upon such a small incident a proposition to put the entire system of the United States upon the same. It is about as ridiculous as to say abandon the railroads, abandon the steamships, because the Wright brothers in an airplane have been able to stay in the air one hour. In New York state alone, if the Oklahoma plan had been carried out for the past four years, it would have taken a guaranty fund of \$44,000,000. Now if the country has such a fund what would it do with it? Think of how much money that would be taken out of circulation. It would have been more expensive to the country to keep this fund than it would to have spent it. Every one of us can recognize the beauties of a plan providing




