Republicans of Note Are Being Sent to All Sections.

BARNARD TO MAKE TRIP.

ALL TOWNS IN COUNTY WILL BE VISITED BY CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATE—WEEK'S SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED.

One of the best attended out-township meetings held by the Republicans this campaign was that at Fountain City this afternoon. New Garden township is safely within the Republican ranks, but nevertheless the speakers' bureau believed an orator or two ought to discourse to the good citizens of that community. There are only two tickets in the field in New Garden, Republican and Prohibition. Eli Ritter and M. Dowling were scheduled to provide the red fire and illuminate the facts as they went along. Each is capable of doing his share.

Tomorrow evening at Webster, Robert Brown, former clerk of the supreme court, will tell why the Republicans should elect William Howard Taft and James E. Watson. Mr. Brown can do it, too, and he can sizzle up the opposition candidates to a fine brown turn, so a good sized crowd is expected to hear him. While Brown is proving an entertainer at Webster, Samuel Spooner will be carrying out the program over at Whitewater. Now, Whitewater is in Franklin township. Up in that section of the county, they know nobody but Republicans. The Democrats, nor any other party, but a township ticket in the field to contest the Republicans. What's the use, they asked.

Vaudeville at the Phillips.

A bill such as at the New Phillips this week is a vast relief from the average vaudeville program. Occasionally one sees a bill that is as good in the first as at the last, but not often. The bill at this house this week, is as consistently good as any that will be here this season.

It opens with the Rinaldoes, who do a novelty hoop rolling turn. Hoop rollers there are in abundance, but not of the class of the Rinaldoes. Part of their act is complex and calls for a world of skill, but these people get away with everything in splendid style.

"Hotel Repose," the farce presented by Wesson, Walters and Wesson, brought down the whole-souled applause of the house. It is a laugh from beginning to end and really one of the best farces that has been seen here for some time.

Carley Carlos is a French danseuse and singer. She can dance and sing, as none have danced and sung on the New Phillips stage for some time. SIX LIVES LOST IN WESTERN STORM

All Traceable to Snow in Colorado.

Denver Colo., Oct. 20.—Six accidental deaths are traceable to a snowstorm which prevailed in Colorado Saturday night and Sunday. Besides seven persons sustained serious injuries in railroad collisions and by coming in contact with live wires. The dead:

Joseph Henry, killed by wire in Denver; J. J. McCloskey, killed by wire at Louisville; Mrs. Lizzie Winslow, killed by wire at Fort Collins; August Carson, frozen near Longmont; Leonardo F. Banker, scalded in wreck caused by collision on Rock Island, near Carlton; Henry John, killed in collision on Union Pacific in Denver.

WHEN SILENCE WAS GOLDEN.

Speechmaking by Presidential Candidates No Longer Dangerous.

The modern practice of speechmaking by presidential candidates is in marked contrast to the early practice. In former times it was considered undignified for a candidate for president to make any open effort in his own behalf, and candidates generally observed strict silence. The theory was that if a candidate opened his mouth to say anything or even wrote the most commonplace letter it would be used against him.

General Scott, Whig candidate for president in 1852, owed his defeat in part to two innocent but unfortunate expressions used by him long before his nomination. In 1846, when he expected to be ordered to Mexico, he spoke the support of the administration for his military plans by saying in a published letter that "soldiers had a far greater dread of a fire upon the rear than of the most formidable enemy in the front." For this expression President Polk declined to order him to Mexico at that time, and when Scott was nominated for president six years later he never heard the last of "the fire upon the rear."

The other expression occurred in a note to the secretary of war. One day the secretary called at General Scott's office and found that he was absent. On returning and learning that the secretary had called the general wrote a note in explanation of his absence, saying that he "had only stepped out for a moment to take a hasty plate of soup." When he was nominated for president the "hasty plate of soup" figured in all sorts of caricatures and brought upon him ridicule that he did not deserve.

Abraham Lincoln, a frequent speaker prior to his nomination, did not utter a word publicly during the campaign. He made no addresses, wrote no public letters and held no conferences. His letter of acceptance contained only 134 words. The practice of speechmaking by candidates after their nomination began with James A. Garfield.—Indianapolis News.

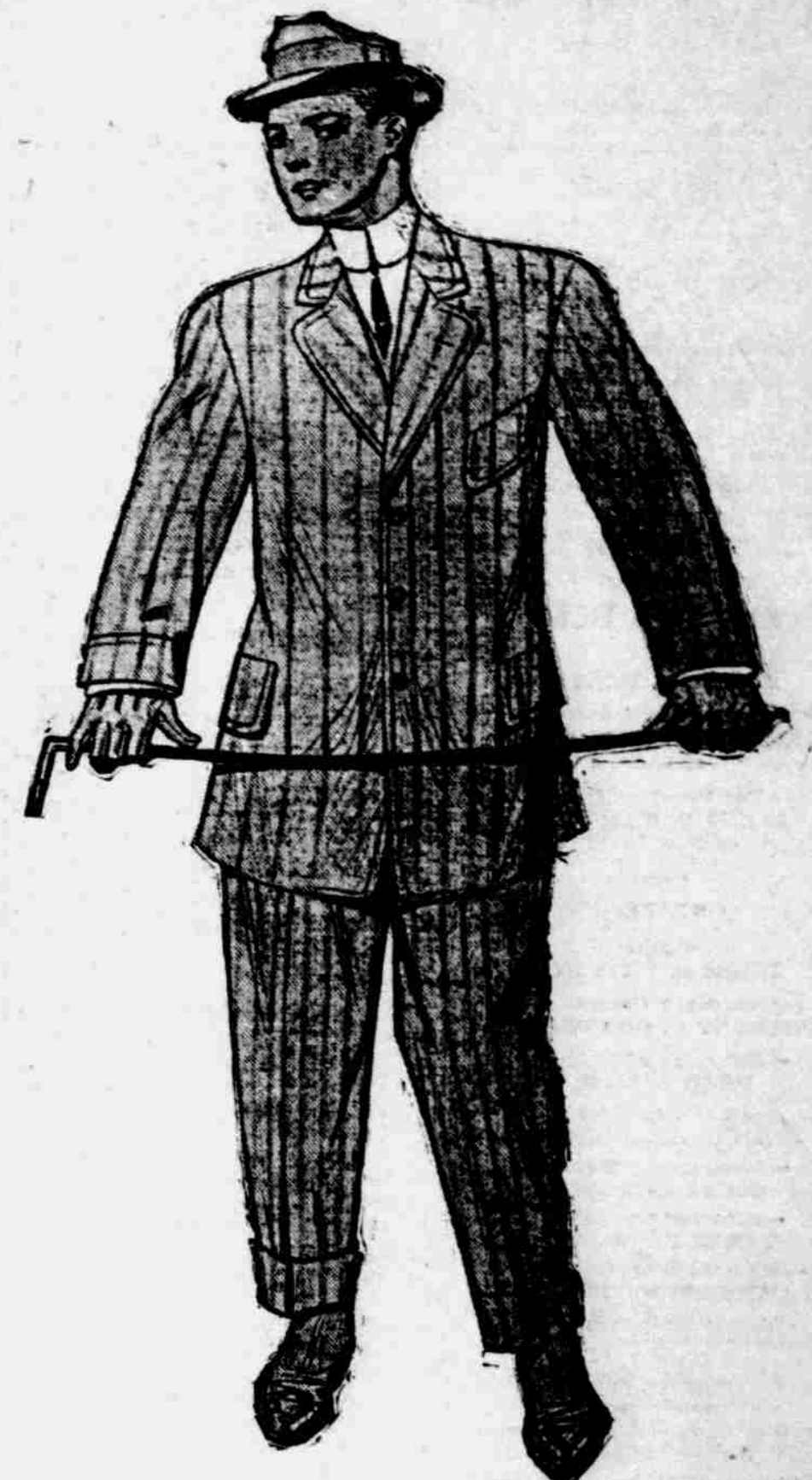

ROOSEVELT ORDERS A SPEEDY TRIAL

Acts in Behalf of Depositors
Against Thieving Cashier.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 20.—President Roosevelt, after hearing a committee of the depositors of the Farmers and Drivers' National bank, of Waynesburg, Pa., instructed United States District Attorney Dunkle, of Pittsburg, to take up within a week the prosecution of the case of the depositor against Cashier J. B. F. Rinehart, charged with having abstracted \$1,300,000 from the bank's funds over two years ago.

The depositors had told the president that they feared the prosecution would be allowed to rest until indictments growing out of the conviction of the cashier would be outlawed by the statute of limitations.
