Clouds and the Weather.

When two weather prophets disagree does it argue error or incompleteness in either? No, says the author of "Storms and Storm Signals" in Eschting. The data upon which they base their predictions do not always bear one interpretation. Thus:

Because the clouds indicate weather in a different manner according to the geographical location of the observer, and also because they are in themselves but byproducts of the weather and are not causes, weather predictions from clouds at sea should be taken with plenty of reservation of judgment. To say, for instance, that at a "red sky at night sailors delight" is very truthful and possibly truthful where knowledge is conspicuous by its absence, but a red sky at night may mean almost anything from a surplus of moisture in the air, meaning probably rains, to a volcanic eruption 2,000 miles away which has sent great clouds of dust into the air, causing the red color by reflection and refraction of the light rays.

Italy Says 'Abruzzi Will Wed; Senator Elkins Says He Don't Know

Turin, Oct. 21.—The Duke of the Abruzzi has suddenly disappeared from Turin, and as search has failed to locate him the report has gained circulation that he has left for America, sailing under an assumed name.

While it is stated in some quarters that the duke is already on his way to the United States, it is also asserted on equally reliable authority that he will not leave Italy until after his promotion as read admiral, which is expected to take place Nov. 11, on the occasion of the king's birthday.

Among other reports that find currency here is one to the effect that the duke will proceed to the United States under the strictest incognito and that his marriage with Miss Elkins will oc-

cur during the presidential election, when it is hoped the event will pass unnoticed.

Elkins, W. Va., Oct. 21.—When the cable dispatches from Turin and London in connection with the alleged engagement between Miss Katherine Elkins and the Duke of Abruzzi were brought to the attention of United States Senator Elkins, he said: "The information is news to my family and myself. SUES FOR INSURANCE

E. M. Campfield Files Suit Against Insurance and Trust Companies.

DEMANDS \$3,000 ON POLICY

E. M. Campfield appears as plaintiff in a suit entered in the Wayne circuit court today against the Cosmopolitan Fire Insurance Company and the People's Loan and Trust Company of Winchester. The suit is brought on insurance policy, the demand of \$3,000. This is the second insurance company to be made the object of suit by Campfield as the result of the fire, which destroyed the Colonial building in this city, owned by him and mortgaged to the People's Loan and Trust Company.

The defendant company has refused to pay the insurance claim on the ground the People's Loan and Trust Company was its agent at Winchester and accepted the Colonial risk only a few days before the fire occurred.

WORK FIVE HOURS TO RECOVER BODIES

Two Men Killed in a Mine Near Shelbyville.

Shelbyville, Ind., Oct. 21.—George Morris and Thomas Botts were crushed to death in Miami mine No. 1. Workmen were five hours recovering the bodies. Morris' wife and children are on their way from England.

BRICKS REMOVED.

Almost coincident with its work of improvement, the street railway company has resumed the work of destruction. It was only a few weeks ago that the rails between Fourth and Fifth streets on Main street were re-

placed by new and heavier rails and the paving was relaid in concrete. The work was well done, but now the bricks have been removed again in several places and dumped back in helter skelter fashion.

Rome a seaport! This ideal which has been long under discussion, is according to a British consul's report, about to be realized. Several schemes have been brought forward, including one for a ship canal something like that which has opened Manchester to the sea. The royal commission appointed to study the question has, however, adopted the project proposed by the Italian Board of Works, which is to dredge the Tiber sufficiently to allow ordinary steamers to approach Rome from the river's mouth at Fiumicino, where important entrance works are to be undertaken. Thus the transfer of cargoes from steamer to rail at Civita Vecchia, fifty miles off, will be no longer necessary.
