Boston.—Bryan carries the city by 506, with one precinct missing.

Boston.—The Boston Globe announces Taft carried Massachusetts by 100,000.

Boston.—One hundred cities and towns in Massachusetts gave Taft \$0,909; Bryan 11,649.

Boston, Mass.—Early indications are that William Howard Taft will carry Massachusetts by a plurality of 55,000.

Boston.—Forty towns in Massachusetts gave Taft, 10,756; Bryan, 3,654; Blagen, 337. The same towns in 1904, gave Roosevelt, 10,910; Parker, 4,198.

New York—159 precincts in Boston give Bryan, 81,836; Taft, 29,598; for Gov. Draper (Rep.), 23,463; Vahrl, (Dem.), 33,884.

Boston—Republican congressmen are elected from the First, Second, Third, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Twelfth, Thirteenth and Fourteenth districts in Massachusetts and from First and Second districts in New Hampshire.

Boston—Bryan carried Boston in Tuesday's election by a narrow margin of 587 votes. The total Bryan vote was 40,237 while Taft polled 39,850. In 1904 Parker carried the city with 49,032 votes against 38,422 for Roosevelt.

Minnesota

St. Paul—While Taft carried the state by probably \$0,000, the Governorship in Minnesota hangs in the balance, the result being so close, that both Chairman Day of the Democratic state committee and Bryan of the Republican state committee claim the state by small majorities.

St. Paul, Nov. 4.—At midnight the Minneapolis Journal claimed a landslide for Taft with chances for Jacobson for governor.

St. Paul—223 precincts in Minnesota give Taft, 23,513; Bryan, 13,591; Jacobson, 18,687; Johnson, 24,236.

St. Paul—28 precincts in the city give Johnson (Dem.) for governor, 690; Jacobson, 605.

New York—Minnesota's republican chairman Brown wired Hitchcock the largest vote in the history of the state was out. Taft carries state by 150,000.

Newark, N. J.—259 precincts outside of Newark, Taft received 50,949; Bryan 29,724. Same in 1904, Roosevelt 49,949; Parker 29,693.

Newark, N. J.—Everett Coleby, leader of the New Idea faction of the republican party was re-elected to the state senate.

Republican National Chairman Extends Thanks to the People.

TRIBUTE PAID TO HUGHES.

SAID GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK WAS ONE MUCH TO AID THE NATIONAL TICKET AND DESERVED TO WIN.

New York, Nov. 4.—Chairman Frank H. Hitchcock, of the republican national committee, made the following statement:

"The returns speak for themselves. There seems to be no longer any doubt of the state. The electoral vote will show that my estimate was correct. It looks now, I think, as if I must have underestimated it. The returns have exceeded my expectations.

"The plurality in Indiana will be less than I expected. That in Illinois is far more than anticipated, and so it goes, where one state has not quite come up to the figures I had expected some other state has gone far beyond. The latest returns from Maryland indicate that we have carried that state by about 8,000 to 10,000 and that is more than I believed it would give.

"I predicted that Governor Hughes would be elected. To Mr. Hughes we owe much. As a campaigner he has helped wonderfully in the national contest. All of us here at headquarters were greatly interested in the fight. He has earned his victory, and we are glad for him and grateful to him for the help he has given us."

When Mr. Hitchcock was asked to what he attributed the victory of the national ticket, he replied:

"The people have explained that. It is not for me to say anything more except to thank the people.

"I do not think any formal statement from me, further than what I have said to you, is necessary," he said to some newspaper men.

Jackson, Miss.—Bryan carried state by 50,000.

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Jacksonville, Fla.—The Times Union says returns from Southern states show that Taft has made wonderful gains. Florida as one gave 20,000 more than to Roosevelt four years ago.

Milton, Ind., Nov. 4.—Two of the oldest voters in Milton, Tuesday, were Elijah Hurst and Peter Wissler, the latter will be 84 years old in February, and the former was 84 years old a few days ago. Both are prominent farmers and each assisted every day this fall in corn gathering.

Des Moines, Ia.—Incomplete returns indicate that Iowa will give Taft a majority of 40,000 votes, though Bryan has made tremendous gains over his last count against Roosevelt. B. F. Carrell will be elected governor by about the same majority.

Indications are that republicans have lost a larger number of the legislative districts than usual, but will be reelected to the front, where guerrilla warfare is now being carried on by Servian bands.
