

TWO MORE RAILWAY ACCIDENTS OCCUR

One Fatally Injured in Rock Island Wreck.

Pueblo, Colo., Nov. 12.—Rock Island passenger train No. 7, west bound from Chicago, dashed into the rear end of an extra west bound freight during a blinding snow storm at Fountain, 30 miles north of Pueblo, at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Engineer Henry Brosso, of Pueblo, was fatally injured; Alonzo King, of Salt Lake City, received a severe scalp wound, while Nelson A. Cantrell, a Chicago broker, was thrown through a hole which was torn in the sleeper and landed in a creek by the roadbed.

Pennsylvania Train Wrecked.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Nov. 12.—Accommodation train No. 146 on the Monongahela division of the Pennsylvania railroad, was wrecked at the south end of the Panhandle bridge over Monongahela river. The engineer and fireman were seriously burned when the engine tender and baggage car left the rails. There were many passengers on the train, and all had a narrow escape from death or serious injury.

ONE THOUSAND MEN TO GO TO WORK

New Castle Auto Factory Starts Machinery.

New Castle, Ind., Nov. 12.—The Maxwell-Briscoe Motor Company is this week adding 100 men to its force, and before the first of the year expects to employ more than 1,000 men. The additional men have been imported from Cleveland and Eastern cities and are mostly skilled machinists.

The company is employing more than 700 men, a part of them working at night.

IT CLEANS THE SHIPS.

Sailing Through a Volcano Crater in the Aegean Sea.

In the Aegean sea a vessel may sail into the top of a crater, and though it is hard to find anchorage there, yet a mere sail through is appreciated greatly by captains, because it cleanses the bottom of the ships from marine growth.

More than 2,000 years ago the isle of Santorin was split in half by an earthquake, with the result that what was once the crater of a volcano is now a crescent shaped harbor. Two glistening white towns of Thera and St. Nicholas are perched on the summit of the steep cliffs, whose dark and dismal hue is similar to that of the top of Vesuvius. Standing out against the sky are large numbers of windmills, with many sails, arranged in a perfect circle. These are evidently employed for crushing the olives, which, along with the terraced vines, are the staple product of the island. The Santorin wine is of excellent quality and is highly appreciated in the Levant.

Between the main island on the east and the smaller, Therasia, on the west, are the three small Kaumene islands, all of which have come into existence since the original earthquake, while the largest of the three was "born from the sea" less than 200 years ago, showing that the center of the old volcano has still a certain amount of activity.

The water in the harbor into which the sulphurous streams from this volcanic island rain has a peculiar property which completely cleans off growths of every kind from the bottom of any ship.

"Real Sporty" Woodsman.

The chief recreation of the woodsmen of the Puget sound country is to go to town on Saturday nights. As a valley dweller explained: "They've got money, and they just blow it in. That there is the logger style of it. There's no places of amusement in the town. They can go to the library and sit down or go to a hotel and sit down, but that don't suit 'em. No, they either get drunk or go to church. Some take in both. I've seen 'em at church pretty well loaded. 'Bout seven or twelve o'clock they start for their camp. Most likely they hire a rig and go eight or ten fellers to a team. Oh, they're sporty! There's nothing too good for the loggers and, take 'em as a whole, they're the best class of men I ever run up against."—Clifton Johnson in *Outing Magazine*.

Foraker Will Make Battle of His Life to Retain His Seat in the Senate

Washington, Nov. 12.—"If you think Senator Foraker is out of the senatorial race, you are greatly mistaken; if you think he has lost his friends in Ohio, you are mistaken again."

So said Senator Charles Dick, just before starting for Ohio. Senator Dick asserted very emphatically that Senator Foraker had not only not retired from the senatorial race, but intended to make the fight of his career for reelection. "And unless the supporters of all the other candidates combine on one man, say Charles P. Taft," con-

tinued Senator Dick, "I do not believe that they will be able to take the prize from him."

"The attacks upon Senator Foraker have served to rally his friends around him. The attacks have taken on the aspect of persecution, and the inevitable results have been that a reaction in the senator's favor has set in."

From another source it was learned that Senator Foraker has prepared a speech in defense of his record, which he will probably deliver soon after the opening of the senate.

RECEIVERS NAMED FOR JOHNSON'S PETS

New Move in the Cleveland, O. Traction Squabble.

Cleveland, O., Nov. 12.—Two receivers for the Municipal Traction company and the Cleveland Railway company, were appointed today by Judge Taylor, who announced his decision without hearing the arguments of attorneys for the Central Trust company of New York, applicant for a receiver.

Judge Taylor made it clear that the receivers were merely to preserve the property and that he would not undertake to determine the rights of the Cleveland Railway company or the Municipal Traction company to restoration of their property, but would reserve that question for the final hearing.

LIED TO SATISFY CHINESE PRIDE

Newspaper Says Storm Separated Fleet.

Pekin, Nov. 12.—In order to satisfy the pride of the Chinese people the official newspaper, controlled by Grand Councillor Yuan Shai Kai, explains the fact that only half the American battleship fleet—that is to say, eight vessels—visited Amoy as the guests of the Chinese government, by declaring that the fleet was dispersed by a storm on its way to the Chinese coast, and the fate of the other eight vessels is unknown. The foreign board accepts this statement with complacency.

The American legation was not consulted prior to its publication.

LOVER SHOOTS GIRL; AND SLAYS HIMSELF

Hamilton Youth Wished to Marry; Parents Objected.

Hamilton, O., Nov. 12.—As a result of a double shooting affray at the residence of Mrs. B. Camele, 180 Rebecca street, Chester A. Johnson is dead and Rosie Ouimet is in the hospital with five bullet wounds in her body and may not live. Johnson did the shooting. He had been keeping company with the young woman against the wishes of her parents. He left a note saying:

"If we can not live for each other we can die for each other. Perhaps people will now be sorry they parted us."

Ancestors of the Fox.

Herr K. Toldt of Vienna has produced what he and others regard as virtually conclusive evidence that foxes are descended from ancestors whose bodies were clothed with horny scales, like those of the pangolins, or scaly ant eaters. This evidence is based upon the examination of the skins of young foxes and depends not only upon the arrangement of the hairs, but upon the fact that the skin itself exhibits a structure such as would be shown by that of a pangolin after the removal of the scales.

Suits Entered in an Ohio Circuit Court.

Lima, O., Nov. 12.—Wade H. Ellis, first assistant to the attorney general of the United States, acted here as attorney for the State of Ohio in the outer suits against the Solar Refining Company, Buckeye Pipe Line Company and the Ohio Oil Company, auxiliaries of the Standard Oil Company.

The suits came up in Circuit Court before Judges Caleb H. Norris, Silas E. Hurin and Michael Donnelly. Virgil P. Kline, Western counsel for the Standard Oil Company, argued for the defense. The judges took the suits under advisement. A decision is expected in a day or two. The actions were filed nearly three years ago by Mr. Ellis when acting as attorney general of Ohio.
