## ATTEMPT TO SLAY

## KAISER IN WRECK

German Officials Discover a Plot to Blow Up the Train.

## CARTRIDGES ON TRACK.

WILLIAM HAS ACCEPTED CURB WHICH VON BUELOW AND HIS PEOPLE SOUGHT TO PLACE ON HIS TONGUE.

Frankfort-on-the-Main, Nov. 18.—Rumors are current here that an attempt had been made to blow up the train on which Emperor William journeyed from Donaueschingen to Berlin.

The royal railway administrative office here makes public a statement in connection with the incident. According to this statement, on both Sunday and Monday, a dynamite cartridge was found on the tracks near the station at Muhlen, between Frankfurt and Hanau. The cartridges were not found on the tracks over which the imperial train was to pass, but on the tracks paralleling these.

As this occurred in Hessian territory, the state's attorney at Darmstadt, has instituted an investigation.

**Kaiser Submits to People.**  
Berlin, Nov. 18.—Emperor William has accepted the bridge which the German people have sought to place upon his tongue. To Chancellor von Buelow, who was the messenger of the reichstag, the kaiser has pledged himself that he will commit no more "glaring indiscretions," such as the now famous London Daily Telegraph interview.

The submission of the kaiser has caused great joy throughout the empire. It was announced last evening, following an interview between the kaiser and von Buelow at Potsdam. The people had feared that the only result of the interview would be the resignation of von Buelow. This was because of the attitude which the kaiser hitherto has taken. The kaiser has kept in ominous silence, replying not a word to the lengthy reports on the condition of affairs which were sent to him daily by von Buelow. Yesterday, however, he had nothing but friendship toward his chancellor.
