SHERIFF SMUTZER  
PLACED ON STAND

Subjected to Fierce Cross Examination by Lamphere's Attorney

## VISITED GUNNESS HOME.

OFFICIAL TELLS OF STATEMENTS  
MADE TO HIM BY LAMPHERE  
PREVIOUS TO THE WOMAN'S  
DEATH.

Laporte, Ind., Nov. 19.—Sheriff Smutzer was subjected to a fierce cross examination today by Ray Lamphere's attorney. The defense tried to bring out that Smutzer had been on visiting terms at the Gunness home and that he had been attempting to investigate the queer doings there months before the fire.

Explanation of the \$10,000 story referred to in the letter from Mrs. Gunness to A. K. Helgelein, regarding the disappearance of his brother, was made yesterday afternoon and it will prove a strong link in the chain of evidence that is being woven around Lamphere for the alleged murder of Helgelein. Lamphere is under indictment for the murder of Helgelein and for complicity with Mrs. Gunness in that murder.

Sheriff Smutzer's testimony related that Lamphere had told him (Smutzer) that Mrs. Gunness was then looking for a man named Helgelein, who was wanted in Aberdeen, S. D., for having killed a man in a gambling house and robbing him of \$10,000. Sheriff Smutzer telegraphed the authorities in Aberdeen and received a reply that there had been no such murder or robbery, and that Helgelein was a well-known farmer in that vicinity. Smutzer paid no further attention to the charge. A month later Lamphere, when questioned by Sheriff Smutzer regarding Helgelein, told him that Helgelein had left Laporte for Chicago that morning on the 5:15 train. Sheriff Smutzer also testified to seeing Lamphere watching Mrs. Gunness one day in the courthouse when she came to his office. She complained about Lamphere annoying her, and when the sheriff went to Lamphere and asked why he did not leave the woman alone he did not answer.

Smutzer testified to being notified about 6 o'clock on the morning of April 23 of the fire and of going there immediately with Deputy Sheriff Austin.

Finding the Bodies.  
He told of taking charge of the search for the bodies and of keeping a gang of men at work all day, and of finding the bodies in the north corner, where the fire had been hottest all day, and where the greatest amount of debris was found. The bodies of the two children were found first. The arms and legs were not detached when discovered, but they fell away when the bodies were moved. The head also of one of the children looked solid enough until it was touched, when it almost fell to pieces. The two girls were together, face downward, appearances indicating that the largest one had her arms clasped around the other. There was a small hole in the head of one of the girls. The large adult body was on its back, a short distance away, and in the arms was the little boy. The arms and legs of some of the bodies were burned off.

Daniel M. Hutson and William Humphrey, who helped the sheriff search the ruins of the Gunness home related their experiences, which varied in no way from their former story. Hutson is the man who recently told of seeing a woman resembling Mrs. Gunness at the farm on July 2. The Connecticut Fire Insurance Company refuses to pay Executor Wesley Fogle of the Belle Gunness estate, the face of the policies, \$13,000, on the house and contents, all of which were destroyed in the fire on the morning of April 23. The company refuses to pay on the ground that they will have to be shown that Mrs. Gunness did not set fire to the house herself, and also they contend that the place was used by the owner for illegitimate purposes—murder, and wholesale murder at that.

## NOT A DAUGHTER.

In a recent account of the death of Joseph Brush in his Michigan home, it was stated that Mrs. O. C. Krone was a daughter. This report was incorrect. Mrs. Krone being of no relation to the deceased.
