GETS SENATE SEAT AFTER 14 YEARS

Governor Cummins of Iowa,
Elected by Legislature
In Iowa, Today.

GARST SUCCEEDS HIM.

SERVES UNTIL JANUARY 1 WHEN
CARROLL WILL RULE OVER
IOWA STATE AFFAIRS FOR THE
NEXT FOUR YEARS.

Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 24.—After being for fourteen years a candidate for United States senator from Iowa, Governor Cummins was elected today by a special session of the state legislature, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator William B. Allison.

After the legislature in joint session balloted for senator, and the result was declared, Governor Cummins resigned his position as governor, and Lieutenant Governor Garst will be inaugurated governor. The latter will hold the position only until January 1, when he will be succeeded by present State Auditor Carroll, who won out for governor at the republican primaries last June.

The executive council at a late hour last night had not finished the canvass of the vote for presidential electors or state officers, but it was announced that Taft had carried the state by about 75,000, and republican state officers have been elected by majorities ranging from 60,000 to 65,000.

Bryan Loses Elector.
Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 24.—There was an impression that Bryan would get one electoral vote from Missouri because W. W. Brannock, Sixteenth district democratic elector, received a higher vote than Henry W. Kiel, republican elector at large. The statute provides, however, that the elector receiving the highest vote in the state against the elector living in the same district as that in which he lives is elected. As Brannock does not live in Kiel's district his heavy vote does not profit him.

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 24.—Full official returns of the recent presidential election received, show that the democratic electors received 87,043 and republican 56,547 votes.

Kansas For Taft.
Topeka, Kan., Nov. 24.—The state canvassing board finished its canvass of the election returns. The total vote cast in Kansas was 375,893, as follows: Taft, 197,186; Bryan, 161,206; Debs, 12,420; Chafin, 5,032; scattering, 68; Taft's plurality, 35,957.

Wisconsin Returns.
Madison, Wis., Nov. 14.—The official vote for president in Wisconsin was announced as follows: Bryan, 166,707; Chafin, 11,579; Taft, 248,673; Debs, 28,146; Taft's plurality, 81,966.

Oregon's Vote.
Portland, Ore., Nov. 24.—The following is the official vote of Oregon for presidential electors November 3: Taft, 62,530; Bryan, 39,049; Chafin, 2,682; Debs, 7,430; Higgen, 289.

Louisiana for Bryan.
Baton Rouge, La., Nov. 24.—The secretary of state announced the official vote of Louisiana in the presidential election as follows: Bryan, 63,568; Taft, 8,958; Debs, 2,538; Higgen, 73.
