## CURB ON KAISER

Arguments of Liberals and Socialists in Reichstag Today.

ARGUMENTS ARE ADVANCED

Berlin, Dec. 2.—In advocating the curbing of the power of the Kaiser, arguments were advanced in the Reichstag today. Socialists want the Kaiser to be deprived of his power to declare war without the consent of the federal council and the Reichstag. The Liberals were more diplomatic in their demands, which advocate a constitutional government and making the Kaiser liable to impeachment by the courts in event of malfeasance in office.
