

## DEMETRAL COMES FOR HIS TRAINING

Champion Wrestler of England  
Arrives Here for His Bout  
Against Olson.

FINE "GO" IS EXPECTED.

Demetral, the wonderful Greek wrestler and the light heavyweight champion of England, will arrive here this evening so that he can complete his training for his match with Olson, Friday night at the coliseum, on the "field of battle." Demetral brings his championship belt with him and it will be placed on exhibition in some public place.

When Olson and Demetral weigh in it is an even bet that both men will tip the scales with the same weight. Demetral is also built on somewhat similar lines as the crack Indianapolis light heavyweight—long of legs and powerfully built about the chest.

It has not been decided who the referee of the match will be but the selection may fall upon LaSalle. It is thought that he would be acceptable to both wrestlers.

Demetral is known as one of the roughest mat workers in the business and Olson always forgets his parlor manners when he enters the ring so a contest of the rough and tumble variety is looked for. "They carried him out once and if he starts anything with me they will carry him out again," is what Demetral says of Olson. When Olson is informed of this he will, as usual, smile his contemptuous, sneering smile. It is said, as much responsible for his victories as his great strength, long reach and wonderful skill. "I have never been beaten in Richmond and I don't intend to break this record Friday night," Olson remarked yesterday to a Richmond friend who saw him at his training quarters in Indianapolis.
