WANTS BETTER CONDITIONS

SECRETARY OF STATE BOARD OF
HEALTH HAS LEGISLATIVE BILL
FOR PROTECTION OF HEALTH
OF INDIANA SCHOOL CHILDREN

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 8.—Dr. J. N.
Hurty of the State Board of Health,
has made a rough draft of a bill which
the State Board will present to the
coming session of the Legislature, for
the bettering of schoolhouse conditions
in Indiana. The name under
which the bill will be presented is: "A
bill for an act entitled, an act to pro-
tect and conserve the lives of school
children, providing for medical inspection;
providing healthful school houses
and requiring the teaching of hygiene."

The proposed act would require that
the site of school buildings built after
it went into effect be dry. This, said
Dr. Hurty, would do away in time with
2,000 damp and moldy buildings in
which Indiana children are now attend-
ing school, and in which consump-
tives are being made. The law would
require school buildings to be sanitary.
Sanitary buildings can be erected, he
says, as cheaply or more cheaply than
insanitary buildings.
