Union City, Tenn., Dec. 14.—Clad in rough homespun, with ragged trousers tucked deep into coarskin boots, with straggling beards and huge slouch hats but always with the inevitable long-barreled rifle or big pistol, in plain view, denizens of the Reelfoot district assembled here for the opening scene of the night riger trials.

They are the friends and relatives of the men who are held under military guard over at the barracks. They ignore the townspeople, or glance at them with scowls. Silently and singly they wander through the streets or stand for hours outside the barracks, gazing curiously up at the windows of the room above in which their friends are held.

They feel keenly this trouble, do these rough, but simply grown-up children of the Tennessee backwoods. They believe that they are being persecuted. The issue is clearly drawn. There is no misunderstanding. Both sides are face to face ready for the struggle, neither asking or granting quarter. It is a finished fight between organized lawlessness and the forces of order.

M'GAHAN AND SCOBELFF.

The Newspaper Man's Picture of the Great Russian General.

McGahan was the correspondent who first described to Europe the Bulgarian atrocities. What a brilliant creature he was, with his steel blue eyes, his face as delicately chiseled as though it were of marble! His light frame and that suggestion of absolute courage, iron resolve, under the almost femininity of the features. He was one of the intimates of Scobeff—indeed, the men were so attached to each other that Scobeff nearly always insisted that McGahan should share his tent with him, and McGahan was in the tent of Scobeff the night after the disastrous assault on Plevena. Scobeff was, said McGahan, a wonderful picture of the horrors and terrors of war. His face was black with powder, his uniform was in rags, and his sword was twisted like a corkscrew. It is evident from this description that Scobeff took part with his own hand in some of the work of the day. There was a sequel, by the way, to this picture. I am not quite sure whether McGahan published it, but he told it to me. Scobeff was always a dandy. Even in leading a charge he was dressed with dandical precision. In the middle of the night McGahan was woken up, and he saw Scobeff dressing himself with great care, putting on a new uniform and even perfume his hair and clothes. And then came another transformation. Scobeff, his elaborate toilet finished, sat down on his bed and burst into shower of tears and a tempest of sobs, thinking over all his poor men who had been so vainly sacrificed in the attempt to gain the fortress.—London M. FOUND WIFE IN ANOTHER'S EMBRACE

**ILLINOIS MAN MURDERED BOTH
ACCORDING TO PLAN.**

Roodhouse, Ill., Dec. 14.—Roodhouse and Greene county are in a frenzy of excitement over a double murder here Saturday night. William Barnhart, employee of the Chicago and Alton railroad, shot and killed his wife in Mrs. Emma Tracy's boarding house.

Half an hour later he went to the Hotel Roodhouse, and, after cautioning a group of men there to get out of range, sent one bullet through the heart and another just below the heart of Carl Clapp, manager of a grain elevator here.

Barnhart charged that Clapp and his wife had been too friendly.

Barnhart admitted his crime, and said he had carefully planned it.

"I went to my home at 8 o'clock Saturday night and found it locked," he said. "I broke the outer door and then found the bedroom locked, broke it open and found my wife in Clapp's embrace."
