

PRESIDENT ORDERS COUNTRY'S DEFENSE

State of War Practically Exists between Holland and Venezuela.

SURRENDER IS DEMANDED

NEWS OF SIEZING OF VENEZUELAN VESSEL CAUSES WILDEST EXCITEMENT—DEMONSTRATION AGAINST PAPER.

The Hague, Dec. 15.—The Dutch warships today seized another Venezuelan ship at Contraband and put the crew ashore and took the prize to Willemstad.

Caracas, Venezuela, via Port of Spain, Dec. 15.—When the news of the capture of the Venezuelan coast guardship Alexis by the Dutch cruiser Gelderland Saturday became known in Caracas a big crowd at once in the Plaza Bolivar, and demonstrated in support of the government.

A decree issued by acting President Gomez places the Republic in a state of defense.

A crowd of citizens, including a large number of students, went to the office of El Constitucional, the organ of President Castro, and indulged in a demonstration. The feelings of this crowd were plainly hostile to Castro and to the steps taken by Gomez. A pitched battle ensued between the employees of the paper and the crowd on the streets. Many shots were exchanged and the fighting lasted five minutes. Several men were wounded, and one has since died. The police were summoned, and when they appeared on the scene armed with rifles the crowd dispersed.

The captain of the Alexis, who came ashore at Puerto Cabello, has sent up to Caracas the communication handed him by the Dutch officer, who came on board from the Gelderland.

Dutch Demand Surrender.

This note is as follows:

"On board the cruiser Gelderland,

"December 12, 1908.

"Her Majesty, the Queen of Holland, has given orders for her warships temporarily to sequester and embargo all Venezuelan government vessels. This is a retaliatory measure. We demand that you lower your flag and surrender your ship and your persons to the commander of the Gelderland. All resistance will be useless. If you resist the result will be the loss of your vessel and death to many of you.

"Second Lieutenant Boisar."

Acting President Gomez issued a decree today in which he relates the capture of the Alexis, after which he declares:

"I consider these acts a true invasion of Venezuelan territory, and an aggression against the Venezuelan government. They constitute a grave offense. The national sovereignty is threatened, and the territorial integrity, honor and dignity of the fatherland is in danger.

"I decree the nation in a state of defense, and consequently the executive assumes and will exercise the extraordinary faculties conferred upon him by Section 8 of Article XX, of the Venezuelan constitution."

The news that the republic had been placed in a state of national defense against Holland, ran through the city like wildfire and in a few moments there was an enormous crowd in front of the Yellow House, the executive mansion, to greet Acting President Gomez.

The populace aroused.

The threatened danger from without had a double effect on the people. They demanded measures of protection, but at the same time they insisted upon the termination of one of the most unpopular courses of the Castro administration—the maintenance of government monopolies in the necessities of life.

RAPIDLY RECOVERS.

Dr. J. M. Wampler, the well known physician, who has been confined to his home from an operation on his leg, is improving very rapidly and it is now thought that he will be able to care for his practice by January 1.

UNION IS ORGANIZED

Theatrical Employees in Richmond Organize a New Association.

OFFICERS ARE ELECTED.

The Richmond lodge, Theatrical Mechanical Association was incorporated today at Indianapolis with no capital stock. The incorporators are Roy Wenger, George Huey, Charles Bennett, John H. Broomhall, Erman Smith, Walter Muey, Frank Buckingham and Earl Mendenhall.

The members of this organization, which is a union for stage employees and men employed as mechanics in theaters, moving picture shows, etc., expects soon to have every theater employe in the city in the organization. Roy Wenger has been elected president, Charles Bennett, secretary and John H. Broomhall, treasurer.

SETTLEMENT SHEET IS NOW FINISHED

Wayne County Pays State Treasury Over \$54,000 of Collections in 1908.

POLL TAX WAS DODGED.

COUNTY AUDITOR HAS PREPARED SHEET FOR STATE OFFICIALS WHO MAKE COLLECTION FROM TREASURER.

The statement of Indiana's share of the taxes paid in Wayne county in the year just closing is \$54,362.81. A part of this amount has been paid into the state treasury by the county treasurer in advance upon the request of the state treasurer. The December settlement sheet has been completed by the county auditor and his deputies. Auditor Coe and Deputy Newlin will go to Indianapolis tomorrow or Thursday and make settlement with the state officers.

The total poll tax paid into the county treasury during the entire year of 1907 was but \$5,266.50. It is evident that there was a great deal of evasion of this tax. The total amount of tax paid into the county treasury and distributed among the various funds, amounted to \$289,772.47. Of this amount the largest portion was paid in corporation tax, the total being over \$70,000.

The total poll tax paid was divided as follows: On account of state revenue, \$937.50; on account of state school revenue, \$937.50; on account of county revenue, \$1,875.00; for other purposes, \$1,516.50.

The amount of money paid to the state treasurer was divided as follows: On account of state tax, \$18,493.03; on account of benevolent institutional fund tax, \$7,117.91; on account of state school tax, \$20,878.74; on account of educational institutional fund tax, \$3,914.84; on account of school fund interest, \$3,557.37; on account of permanent endowment fund interest, \$311.91; on account of docket fees, \$80.

On his six per cent. fee for the collection of delinquent tax, which amounted to \$20,487.53, the county treasurer was paid \$1,228.25.

WOULD PROBE CITY FINANCES

Secretary Harris of Y. M. E. C. Favors Committee Investigation.

COMPARISONS ARE LIKELY.

INVESTIGATION TO BE RECOMMENDED THAT PROPER REMEDIES FOR PRESENT CONDITIONS MAY BE ADMINISTERED.

Secretary E. H. Harris, at the meeting of the Young Men's Business club this evening, will present a resolution providing for the appointment of a committee of three club members to investigate the financial condition of the city, with the end in view of seeing what method should be pursued in reducing the expenses of the municipality. The resolution will further provide that the financial conditions of neighboring towns and cities be investigated so that comparison can be made with the financial condition of Richmond.

Mr. Harris will point out in advocating the adoption of this resolution that it is eminently proper such an investigation be made by the club as it is a non-partisan organization and has the promotion of local business interests as its object.

He will point out that the committee, should it find the local tax rate too high and the expense of city government too great and the administration of the city government not on business principles, could make a comprehensive report on its findings and offer remedies for the conditions as exist. He will point out that a low tax rate and economical expenditures for maintaining the city would be to the great benefit of the business interests of the city, primarily because it would make Richmond an attractive point for manufacturing concerns to locate. He will suggest that the investigating committee submit its report at the January meeting of the club.

At the meeting this evening, Mr. Harris will submit the financial report on the fall festival, which report will undoubtedly be highly satisfactory.

JUSTIN LEROY HARRIS TO LEAVE RICHMOND

Accepts Position With Chicago Firm.

In June he will travel in Europe with Mr. Collins.
