

WATSON DEFEATS THE INSURGENTS

By His Efforts, House Organization Is Saved at Critical Juncture.

ARRIVED JUST IN TIME.

DEMONSTRATION OF TUESDAY WAS FOR TEST OF STRENGTH AND MEASURE AIMED AT SPEAKER WAS CONSIDERED.

Washington, Dec. 16.—Representative Watson, whip of the House, took charge of the republican forces in the house Tuesday just in the nick of time for it was only by the hardest effort on his part that he was able to muster enough strength to prevent the house "insurgents" from winning a notable victory.

The insurgents, led by Congressman Gardner of Massachusetts and aided by the democratic members, carried through a resolution aimed at the speaker and the committee on rules by a vote of 146 to 134.

The house leaders, from Speaker Cannon down, were badly scared by this unexpected rebellious display, and Watson was called upon to take charge of the field forces of the regulars. The organization on the second vote won with only thirteen votes of a majority.

The insurgents undoubtedly wanted a test of strength and they got it. Many of them professed to believe that the demonstration will have an excellent effect upon the house organization and leaders and make the big five and other powers in the lower branch of the National Legislature that have been intolerant of criticism more willing to listen to suggestions with respect to certain changes in the rules.

PENNY ON GRILL

Charges of Rebating on Iron Shipments Being Investigated.

FEDERAL GRAND JURY WORK

Chicago, Dec. 16.—Charges of rebating against the Pennsylvania Railroad are, according to report circulated in the federal building, being investigated by the federal grand jury. The investigation started yesterday shortly after the grand jury entered on its first session. Several employees of the auditor's department of the road and other officials are said to have been summoned to appear before the inquisitorial body and furnish information sought by the United States government in connection with the reported rebate charges.

The investigation hinges on alleged concessions on shipments to the iron industry. Two corporations whose officials and employees have been summoned to appear are the International Harvester company and the Iroquois Iron company.

It was reported that the investigation of the Pennsylvania is not the only one that is contemplated by the government in the line of railway concessions while the present grand jury is in session.

METROPOLITAN

LAW'S REPEAL

Matter Will Be Among First Things Considered by Legislature.

MAYORS HOLD MEETING.

ADVOCATE AMENDMENT TO LAW WHICH PREVENTS MAYORS FROM BEING RE-ELECTED—SENTIMENT OF CITY EXECUTIVES.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 16.—One of the very first things that is going to happen when the legislature opens up for business next month, is the introduction of a bill to repeal the metropolitan police law.

About the next thing will be the introduction of a bill to change the cities and towns law so as to permit mayors and other city officials to be re-elected. Then there will be other important amendments of the cities and towns law asked by the mayors, who met here yesterday afternoon and laid their plans for the legislative campaign.

Mayor Fogarty of South Bend, was one of the leaders in the movement for the amendment that would allow a mayor to be re-elected. He said in an interview that he was in favor of such a change in the law, not because he wished to be re-elected himself, but because he believed such an amendment was right. He did not say that he would not be a candidate, however.

The meeting of mayors was called by Mayor Becker, of Hammond, chairman of the legislative committee of their organization. He is also in favor of permitting a mayor to succeed himself. He was chairman of the meeting, and in a speech he said the mayors of all the cities in the state were in favor of maintaining the cities and towns law, but they believed it should be amended to relieve some of the cities of the third and fourth class from the expensive system of city government. Expensive boards are maintained and in several cities complaint is made about the expense. But he said that board government has put the city of Hammond on a business basis and brought order out of chaos. He believes the people of Hammond wish the law maintained. Mayor Hosey, of Fort Wayne, spoke along the same line.
