Wheat Crop of 1909 Short

Opinion Is Rendered at Meeting of the Indiana Millers' Association in Session at Indianapolis.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 16.—Indiana's wheat crop for the year of 1909 will only average 75 per cent of the wheat crop of 1908. That opinion was rendered yesterday afternoon as the result of an investigation held by the mid-winter convention of the Indiana Millers' association at the closing session in the Denison Hotel yesterday afternoon. It is estimated that the acreage of wheat for the coming year will be only 78 per cent of the acreage of last year and that the crop itself will be only 72 per cent of the 1908 crop.
