Wheat Crop of 1909 Short

Opinion Is Rendered at Meeting of the Indiana Millers' Association in Session at Indianapolis.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 16.—Indiana's wheat crop for the year of 1909 will only average 75 per cent of the wheat crop of 1908. That opinion was rendered yesterday afternoon as the result of an investigation held by the mid-winter convention of the Indiana Miller's Association at the closing session in the Denison Hotel yesterday afternoon. It is estimated that the acreage of wheat for the coming year will be only 72 per cent of the acreage of last year and that the crop itself will be

only 72 per cent of the 1908 crop.

The heavy drought of last summer and fall is alone blamed by the millers for the darkened outlook in the coming crop.

The millers' convention is one of the regular meetings of the year held by the organization. The chief topics of discussion were the action of the United States Department of Agriculture in ruling against the bleaching process universally employed in whitening flour and the present Indiana pure feed stuffs law.

NOT SO MANY SEEDS

Congressmen Are Told They Will Not Have as Many For Distribution.

HIGH PRICES RESPONSIBLE

Washington, Dec. 16.—Like a clap out of a clear sky has come the announcement to the Indiana congressmen that their supply of garden seeds has been cut down. The news has just been broken to the congressmen in a letter from Secretary of Agriculture Wilson.

There is not a single soft and assuaging sentence of the secretary's letter, but in cold-blooded and merciless language he merely states that whereas the congressmen have been getting 12,000 packages of seeds heretofore, they will get hereafter only 10,000 packages of seeds until such time as the price of seeds returns to a normal basis.

In other words, one-sixth of the congressmen's supply of garden seed has been cut off, all because of the high price which the government has to pay for the seeds.
