

## LESS TARDINESS

Teachers' Fight in Several Schools Resulting in Much Good.

## SCHOOL REPORTS BETTER.

The war on tardiness by several Richmond schools has begun to make noticeable difference in the standard of the monthly reports that are made to Supt. T. A. Mott. The report for this month shows the number of minutes lost by tardiness amounted to 1,772, while the number lost for the previous month was 3,199. This is a decrease of some 427 minutes. The decreases were mainly in the High School and the Garfield buildings. It is expected that the crusade against tardiness will soon be taken up by all the teachers of the public schools.

A majority of the members present expressed themselves as being in favor of buying the machines, but preferred to wait until next September before passing the appropriation.

## WOULD HAVE STAR RECEIVER DISMISSED

John C. Shaffer Files Petition In Federal Court.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 17.—John C. Shaffer, as the purchaser of the holdings of Daniel G. Reid in the Star Publishing company, has filed a petition in the federal court asking that the receiver be dismissed and that he be made a co-complainant in the action instituted by Reid.

Judge Anderson fixed December 28 as a date for hearing the petition and December 24 as the final date on which answers could be submitted.

Mr. Shaffer in his petition states that on December 3 he purchased the holdings of Daniel G. Reid, including a demand note, \$400,000 in bonds of the Star Publishing company, \$150,000 in bonds of the Indianapolis Star Publishing company and the common stock held by Reid.
