

MAJORITY FAVORS OPTION LAW REPEAL

Fully 90 Per Cent of Legislators Favor Ward and Township Idea.

BREWERS WORKING HARD.

THREATENED BOLT OF SIX DEMOCRATS TO THE SIDE OF THE REPUBLICANS ON TEMPERANCE ISSUE AROUSES THEM.

Indianapolis, Dec. 18.—At least 90 per cent of the democratic members of the legislature are believed to be determined to vote for the ward and township amendment, which is in line with their platform, but if a few of them in the senate should fluke the bill would be defeated and the present law sustained.

Representatives of the brewery combine are confident that the ward and township unit will be adopted, but they are working harder now that they have learned that there is liable to be a loss among the democrats, it being said six democrats oppose the repeal of the county local option bill.

The bill to amend the county local option law will originate in the house and it is likely that it will be passed there without a great deal of trouble.

It is in the senate that the anti-saloon forces will make their stand.

It is said that there are some democratic members who will not vote for the ward and township unit unless the brewers will agree to a high license measure and a provision limiting the number of saloons to one for each 1,000 people.

The brewery leaders are being informed that some of the democrats wanted the above amendments and they have the matter under consideration now.

Hurtly Would Have Children Walk.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 18.—Dr. J. N. Hurtly, of the State Board of Health, declared yesterday that he was opposed to the use of hacks for carrying children to school in the out townships where the distances are great. The hack, he declared, was unsanitary. If its use is deemed necessary, he suggested that all such vehicles be made uniform and arranged to prevent crowding and good ventilation.

Dr. Hurtly has made investigations of the matter in several counties. He has found that some of the children would have very great distances to walk. "I believe it would be better to walk," said Dr. Hurtly. "I hope to see the return of the old days when all children walked. It makes healthy, sturdy men and women."

KNOX HAS ACCEPTED

MICROBES IN CARS

Dispatch Says Senator Will Become Secretary of State Under Taft.

NEW YORK SUN STORY.

New York, Dec. 18.—A dispatch to the New York Sun from Washington says:

"Philander C. Knox, United States senator from Pennsylvania, has been asked by William H. Taft to become secretary of state in Mr. Taft's cabinet, and he has consented to serve. 'Mr. Knox's acceptance was given somewhat reluctantly, as he believed that his abilities could be utilized better in the national legislature than in the executive government.'

"It is realized by those who are acquainted with the circumstances of the matter that Mr. Knox, in agreeing to take the foreign affairs portfolio is making a great sacrifice of personal inclinations.

"According to what is said here, he feels, however, that if Mr. Taft believed him to be the right man for this high and important office it is his duty to comply with Mr. Taft's desires. Mr. Knox's term in the senate will expire in March, 1911."

Shoe Strings Coveted by Woman Arrested.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 18.—Dora Williams, alleged professional pickpocket and shoplifter, and Edith Allen, an "understudy," were arrested yesterday by Detectives Kinney and Morgan in an East Washington street store, charged with petit larceny and loitering.

An attempt to steal a pair of shoe strings, when she had almost \$200, resulted in the apprehension of the Williams woman, who is believed to be the leader of a professional band of pickpockets and shoplifters operating in the city.


