Yeoman Ferguson of the Richmond station, says that the enlisted strength of the navy at the present time has nearly reached its maximum limit and if congress refuses to authorize an increase it is probable that all sub stations, such as Richmond, will be abandoned. **PENNSYLVANIA MEN GET PRISON SENTENCE**

Convicted in Capitol Graft Cases.

Harrisburg, Pa., Dec. 18.—Judge Kunkel today imposed the maximum sentence on the Pennsylvania capitol grafters. The convicted men follow: J. H. Sanderson, W. P. Snyder, W. L. Mathias, J. M. Shumaker. They were fined \$500 each and given two years in the penitentiary. The cases will be appealed to a higher court.

**SNOW STORM STOPS NEW YORK TRAFFIC**

New York, Dec. 18.—The worst sleet and snow storm of the season played havoc with the city's transportation facilities today, practically paralyzing it for several hours. The ferry boats were unable to run and shipping in the bay is at a standstill.
