LINCOLN LEAGUE
TO HOLD MEETING

Question as to Whether Centennial of Lincoln's Birth Will Be Observed.

REGULAR SESSION IN 1910

ORGANIZATION MEETS BIENNIAL, BUT OWING TO IMPORTANT EVENT THIS CUSTOM MAY BE DEPARTED FROM.

Indianapolis, Dec. 22.—Whether the Lincoln league of the state will generally observe the one hundredth anniversary of Lincoln's birth will be determined by the committee of the state organization which will meet at the Claypool hotel, in this city. The calls have been sent out by the secretary, Will H. Adams, of Wabash. There has been considerable discussion as to whether the league should depart from its custom of meeting biennially, in order to observe the Lincoln centennial. The next regular meeting is scheduled for February, 12, 1910, and many of the members feel that the league should not allow the anniversary to pass without a fitting observance. The officers of the league are: President, E. E. Neal, of Noblesville; vice-president, W. E. Doud, of Fort Wayne; treasurer, Thomas C. Whallon, of Indianapolis; secretary, Will H. Adams, of Wabash. A full representation from all the districts of the state is expected.
