PIONEER CALLED BY DEATH NOTE

Isaac Lamb, aged 88, one of the oldest and best known citizens died last evening at his home West Third and National Road. For many years he has been retired from business. Death was due to senility. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. T. H. Douglass, of Denver, Colo., and three sons, Thomas Lamb of Denver, Col., Albert F. Lamb of Austin, Col., and I. N. Lamb of this city.

The funeral will be held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock from the home. Funeral services and burial will be private. Friends are permitted to call any time Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Lamb has been a resident of this city and vicinity all his life, being born and reared a few miles North of here. For many years he was engaged in the fur business in Centerville. Later he settled estates and bought and sold real estate.

FIERCE FIGHT IN VENEZUELA

Castro Troops Clash with Gomez Crew.

Port Au Prince, Hayti, Dec. 29.—News of a sanguinary battle, fought between adherents of Castro and the crew of gunboat, under orders from the Gomez administration reached here today. Twenty were killed and forty wounded, it is reported. Fighting occurred in an isolated section. The gunboat party was worsted but secured reinforcements and put the enemy to flight.
