STUNTED OAKS.

Miniature Trees That Are Grown in China Bowls.

In the window of a florist stood a row of quaint china bowls, in each of which a tiny, stunted oak tree grew.

"Yes," replied the florist to the visitor's inquiry, "they are real trees—oak, maple and beech trees. We get them

sized tree, dating back many years. "Yes," replied the florist to the breeder's inquiry, "they are real trees—maples and beech trees. We get them from Japan, where the secret of how to rear them is known only to a few. They are raised from seeds or specially selected cuttings, which are watered and tended with that marvelous patience inherent in the eastern race. Fifty years may pass before the tree is considered salable. During this period the plant is trained and its natural tendencies subjugated to the will of the rearer. The gardener prunes and trims and rears and directs it until what Carlyle called genius—"an innate capacity for taking pains." A wide twig may be bound up.
