

## TWENTY HOURS DUTY FOR SOME

Four Patrolmen Had Long  
Period of Service This  
Holiday.

### CLOSING LAW OBSERVED

LIQUOR DEALERS MADE NO EFFORT AT "BOOT-LEGGING"—POLICEMEN ASSIGNED TO NEW BEATS TODAY.

It was twenty hours of duty for four members of the police department today and others were on extra duty, also. The long service men were Lawler, Bundy, Longman and Wierhake, who were transferred from night to day duty with the regular quarterly shift that became effective today. New Year's day is a holiday in this state, and consequently all the saloons were closed tight. The police were out in citizens' clothes with their eyes skinned far back to spy on any fractures of the law, but had found none by noon.

The saloon men have stated they believe any attempt by one of their number to violate the law would be a jeopardy to the entire trade right now. When Emmett Hensley was convicted of violating the law recently he was condemned by several of his brother saloonists for his short sightedness. The liquor men realize that this is no time to offend the public, and the police declared this morning they believe this is one reason why all doors were found tightly locked.

Lawler—Eleventh and Main.

### PLANNING NEW TOWN.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 1.—The United States Steel corporation is planning to build a \$10,000,000 town at head of Lake Superior, about six miles from Superior and Duluth, similar to Gary, Ind. The corporation some time ago announced its intention of building steel mills near Superior at a cost of about \$5,000,000, but since then it has decided to build a model town around the mills and construct a railroad to connect the corporation's Minnesota Range mines with the through railroad lines to Chicago and Milwaukee. By this plan, it is said, the concern will save the expense of shipping worked ore to the Pittsburgh region and will instead, be able to ship finished steel to the West or the East. About a year ago the company purchased several thousand acres of land for the new plant.

A space ten feet square on a bill board facing Lafayette square, in New Orleans, has been given to the New Era Club by Junius Garlick, and will be made to help in the suffrage campaign the club is carrying on. Each week important facts concerning the movement will be announced on the space.

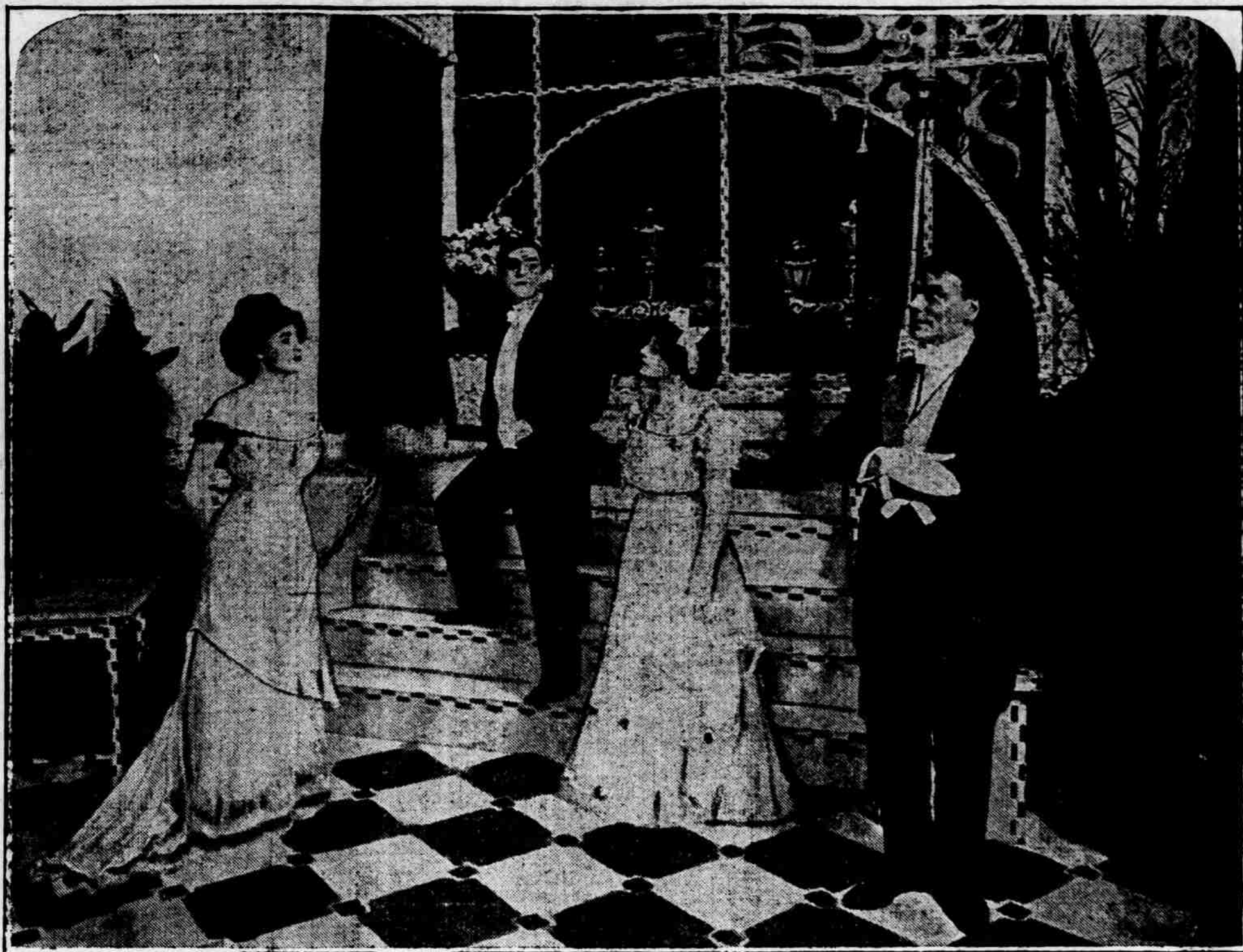

#### BROWN OF HARVARD.

Since George Ade dramatized a college football game, it was inevitable that some one else should see a like opportunity in other departments of scholastic life and especially in under graduate athletics. The expected surprise of this capital opportunity fell to Rida Johnston Young, whose play, "Brown of Harvard," a dramatization of the college boat race this time, will be offered by the Shuberts at the Gennett theater on January 8, with James Young in the title role. The piece purports to take the life of Harvard University and to set it down, complete

and veracious, before the foot ball lights in a manner not only to delight collegians, but also to provide the average theater-goer with an agreeable and engrossing entertainment.

How successful Mrs. Young has been in doing this—in vitalizing the characteristic incidents of a great university into the making of a great play—is attested by the long-runs in both New York and Chicago and to repeatedly successful engagements in all week stands. The story of the play is woven about the affairs and fortunes of the college rowing crew with the excitement of a great race against an English eight as a stirring climax. But although college spirit and youthful exuberance is pronounced as its dominant note, the advance sketch of the plot indicates that the morals of collegiate society, good and bad, enter into it a good deal more than the Harvard regulations ever intended they should, part of the story striking a tragic note to which none of the other great college plays aspire.

### WORK PROGRESSES.

New York, Jan. 1.—When work on the new terminal of the Pennsylvania and other improvements connected with that structure have reached a certain stage, a gigantic bridge will be built to provide a direct connection between Long Island and New England by way of Harlem. It will stretch from Port Morris to Queens County and will span the Hell Gate ship channel with an arch one thousand feet long and 140 feet above the water. With its approaches, the new bridge will be three miles long and will be all steel, but the piers for the arch.

### WAGES ARE SMALL.

Tokio, Jan. 1.—Coolie labor commands about 25 cents per day, although in Kobe, Yokohama, and Nagasaki 37½ and 40 cents are being asked and in many cases allowed. All employers of labor are unanimous in declaring that the quality of the services rendered was going down even faster than the rate of wages was going up.

### SCHOOL OF MINING.

Shenandoah, Penn., Jan. 1.—Under the direction of the Lehigh Coal Company, a school of mining for employees, has been opened at Lost Creek. Eighty men have registered as students and many of them well advanced in years, and the project has had a most auspicious beginning. Numerous officials of the company and mining experts were present at the opening exercises and predict a great future for the institution.

### CURIOUS BILL.

Paris, Jan. 1.—A curious bill has been introduced into the Chamber of Deputies by a member of the Nationalist party, M. Gauthier de Clagny, dealing with the organization of the legislative authority in time of war. M. de Clagny proposes that when a war breaks out the two houses of Parliament shall meet as a National Assembly, and appoint fifty delegates, composed of thirty deputies and twenty Senators, who shall be responsible for the exercise of the legislative power while the war lasts.

### TWO BILLIONS WORTH.

Washington, Jan. 1.—The inventory of the mineral resources of this country made by the National Conservation Commission shows that the present mineral production exceeds \$2,000,000,000 a year, and is second only to agriculture as a contributor to the national wealth. The annual waste in mining and treatment of mineral products is estimated at \$300,000,000. At the present rate of production the coal supply will be exhausted by the middle of the next century.
