TAKE APPEAL TO SUPREME COURT

**Celebrated Martin-Chittwood
Will Case to Go to the
Highest Tribunal.**

FILED IN FAYETTE COUNTY.

**HOWEVER IT WAS BROUGHT TO
WAYNE CIRCUIT COURT ON A
CHANGE OF VENUE—BITTER
CONTEST.**

Judgment having been rendered upon the verdict of the jury in the celebrated Martin-Chittwood case, by Judge Fox of the Wayne circuit court an appeal was taken today to the supreme court of Indiana. Owing to the amount of money involved the law requires the case be taken to the supreme court and not to the Appellate. The suit developed from the attempt of the plaintiffs to have set aside a purported will of the late George Frybarger of Fayette county.

After the original suit was filed in Fayette county, it was brought to the Wayne circuit court upon a change of venue proceedings. The trial lasted for ten days and with but two ballots the jury decided in favor of the plaintiffs and the setting aside of the will. It was alleged in the complaint that undue influence had been brought to bear on Frybarger to have his will made so as to dispose of his entire property, valued at \$12,000 to the defendants.

The allegation was made that Frybarger was a deaf mute from childhood and when he became twenty-one years old, a guardian was appointed for him on the grounds he was of unsound mind. He lived to be more than sixty years old, but the guardianship was not removed. A large number of witnesses was introduced to show him to have been regarded as a person of unsound mind. The defense contended that he was sane and transacted his own business affairs.

The matter of locker rent will be considered at a meeting of the board to be held soon. There is some question as to the charges. The only full length lockers are reserved for sustaining members.

GOOD BALANCE SHOWN.

In a notice issued by the county auditor today it is shown the balance remaining in the common school fund at the close of the past year was \$4,471.43. Applications have been made for more than enough to require all of this amount. Unless the county can loan this money, it must lie idle and the county pay the state interest on it.

KARNS MAKES REPORT.

O. K. Karns, chief transfer clerk of the division of railway mail service at the Panhandle depot has compiled his report for December. It shows the number of letter packages distributed was 2,071, sacks of papers distributed 387, registered packages handled 7,724, registered cases handled 1,297, registered sacks handled 669 and registered pouches 348.

IS NOW RECOVERING.

U. S. GUNBOAT WILL ARRIVE ON MONDAY

Rome, Jan. 2.—It is believed at Rome that a train which left Reggio on the morning of the earthquake, was overwhelmed by a tidal wave as nothing has been heard of the train or passengers. The king has ordered royal palaces at Caserta and Naples turned into hospitals and hundreds of the injured are already occupying them. The American gunboat Scorpion will arrive at Messina Monday to assist the other foreign ships in transporting the refugees. Statistics of the dead and the survivors are still impossible to obtain but from calculations based on the populations and the estimate of the survivors indicates that the figures heretofore given out will not be found to have been exaggerations. There are large numbers dying daily from hunger and exposure. This will probably swell the final total. The actual property loss is now estimated at a billion dollars including some four thousand ships of all descriptions. Semola Still Alive.

DEATHS CONFIRMED.

Definitely Known Consuls Cheney, Lupton and Pierce Killed.

Washington, Jan. 2.—The State department has a cablegram from the consulate at Naples announcing the safety of General Charles Hall, U. S. A., retired, who was supposed to have lost his life at Messina. It also announces the messenger of the American consul at Messina arrived at Naples reporting the death of Consuls Cheney, Lupton and Pierce and that the recovery of their bodies was impossible.

ANXIETY FOR HEALTH.

Muncie, Ind., Jan. 2.—Anxiety is felt for the safety of Perry S. Heath and wife who are supposed to be traveling near the earthquake zone in Italy.

TO MAKE EFFORT IN THE SPRING

South Side Association Still After Cincinnati Factory.

The prospects for locating the Rahn-Carpenter Machine Tool Works of Cincinnati by the South Side Improvement Association appear favorable to the officers of the association. It is understood that no concerted action is being taken by the association at present to obtain the desired factory, but the members are expecting to prosecute the matter to success in the spring.

NAVAL REFORMS.

Washington, Jan. 2.—Reforms in the navy department are to be undertaken by Secretary Newberry. They are not to be sweeping at first, but are to be followed up until the service is put on a satisfactory basis. The changes contemplated include an increase in the general board and the Bureau of construction, which also is to have more latitude, new life and new ideas.
