Indianapolis, Jan. 6.—Governor Marshall today expressed a wish for an early caucus on the senatorship so that the legislature can get down to business. The democrats have called a caucus for next Tuesday night. All candidates for senator have agreed on this date. Marshall has not expressed any preference among candidates. He is keeping his hands off. Democrats of the house today decided on this slate: Speaker, Representative Honan of Seymour; Chief Clerk, Dr. J. W. Vizard of Adams county; Assistant Clerk, J. Fred France of Huntington; Doorkeeper, Thomas Barclay of ratify this list. The senate republicans have picked Senator Wood of Lafayette for president pro tem.
