FAVORABLE WILL
BE ACTION OF THE
COMMISSIONERS

When Election Petition Is Presented to Board Tomorrow They Will No Doubt Order Election.

"WETS" AND "DRYS" WILL HAVE LOBBIES

If Date for Election Is Set at Tomorrow's Session It Will Mark the Beginning of Temperance Fight.

There is every probability the county commissioners will act favorably to the petition for a local option election when the board meets tomorrow. It is certain that if an attempt be made to secure a restraining order or writ of injunction, it will be met with opposition. The commissioners have been informed by the county attorney that there is no need for a delay and it is not believed the board will see fit to hold up the proposition. It is probable a lobby of both the wets and the drys will be on hand.

The solution of the election matter now rests solely with the commissioners. They have been informed it lies within their power to adjourn each of their January sessions until the last day of the month and then order the election at the expiration of thirty days. This would place the date March 2. If by that time the legislature has repealed the law, the commissioners would be petitioned to rescind their order. The commissioners have indicated they will not countenance such a movement. Two members of the board have stated to the Palladium they can not see where action of that kind could be deemed proper. They declare it is not up to them to determine what the legislature may do and that they can be governed only by the existing law. It is not regarded as likely these commissioners will alter their opinion.

If the commissioners do set the date for the election at their meeting tomorrow, it will announce the opening of the real fight. Both the advocates of the liquor interests and the temperance ideas have strong men, whose influence will be called upon. It will be a campaign that in all probability will be more aggressive than that recently waged by the political parties. The temperance forces will resort to public speaking and literature and the saloon forces will no doubt use letter writing and personal influence primarily.

HALL DEFENDANT.

Orange D. Hall, of Cambridge City, is named as defendant in a suit brought in the Wayne circuit court by the Dickinson Trust company, as receiver for the Wayne Oil company. It is alleged Hall subscribed for 2,500 shares of stock in the oil company at \$1 per share and paid for only \$1,000 worth. It is sought by the plaintiff to collect the remaining \$1,500.
