**CLAIM COUNTY BY  
MAJORITY OF 1,800**

**Local Option Organization  
Bases Claim on Result of  
Poll Just Completed.**

**WOMEN HAVE ORGANIZED**

**WILL WAGE CAMPAIGN IN OPTION  
FIGHT LIKE THEY DID IN MAY-  
ORALTY CONTEST—HOLD A  
MEETING TOMORROW.**

The poll taken by the county local option organization has been completed and taking this as a criterion, E. R. Thompson, secretary, has announced that the "dry" would carry the county by a majority of 1800. This city is in the list claimed by the organization, as is also East Germantown, Hagerstown, Dublin, which were regarded as doubtful. Cambridge City is on the doubtful list, but Jackson township is claimed by the advocates of the "drys".  
Mr. Thompson stated that the poll books showed the "drys" would carry the third, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth wards. The first would be "wet" by a small majority while in the fourth the results would be doubtful. A split is expected in the second ward.

**Women Organize.**

The county local option fight has developed into one similar to the last mayoralty race as the women will take a prominent part. Yesterday afternoon at a meeting at the Y. M. C. A. building, the organization of the Woman's Local Option league was partially effected. This afternoon another meeting was held at the residence of Mrs. R. E. Houghton, South Tenth street, to complete the organization.

**MARRIAGE ANNULLED**

**Judge Rules Rhodius Was Mentally Incompetent When Union Was Made.**

**RICH MENTAL WEAKLING**

Indianapolis, Jan. 16.—Judge Mamm holding court at Greenfield this morning annulled the marriage of Elma Dare and George Rhodius of Indianapolis on the grounds of mental incompetency at the time of the ceremony. Rhodius was the sole heir to his mother's estate of nearly a million dollars. As a result of high living, he became a mental weakling and fell a victim to locomotor ataxia. The Dare woman called for him at his hotel at two o'clock in the morning. She took him to Louisville. After she married him she fled to New York with him. Detectives later located them at Cambridge Springs, Pa., and brought him back to Indianapolis. Later a guardian was appointed who placed Rhodius in a sanitarium for treatment. The institution of annulment proceedings followed which resulted today in making him an unmarried man and shut the Dare woman off from any claim on his vast wealth. The attorneys for the woman will appeal the case to the supreme court.
