

PLANT'S SHOWING FOR PAST YEAR WAS REMARKABLE

Excess of Receipts Over Operating Expenses During The Year 1908 Was Shown To Be Over \$30,000.

PATRONS NUMBER OVER TWENTY-THREE HUNDRED

Municipal Light Plant in Good Hands, Shown by Increase In Receipts and Expense Decrease.

The report of Charles Rogers, superintendent of the Municipal Light plant for the calendar year, 1908, showed the excess of receipts over operating expense to be \$31,796.45. This shows the plant is on a paying basis. The plant is also growing in popular favor as is shown by the list of patrons who now number between 2,300 and 2,400. City Clerk C. W. Merrill states that there are many factories considering putting in electrical machinery and that during the ensuing year the business will no doubt be on as steady an increase as during the past.

In Good Hands.

Furthermore the plant's management as shown by the increase in receipts and a decrease in expenses seems to be in good hands. During 1908 the receipts were \$2,904.92 more than in 1907. The operating expense was \$938.08 less during the year than was of the preceding year. A very noticeable gain is shown in the matter of saving on building and equipment. This expense for 1908 was \$19,001.56 less than in 1907.

Makes up Its Deficit.

"At the end of the year 1907 the plant had a deficit of \$6,847.50 due to the installation of a new unit and at the end of last year the plant had over and above operating expenses and building and equipment, \$15,967.37," stated City Clerk C. W. Merrill last evening in commendation of what the plant was doing.

One large expense to the plant during the past year was the change of the Main street overhead system to the A street lines in compliance with the city's ordinance, that all wires be removed from Main street. This expense amounted to about \$4,000 and was charged to building and equipment.

Very curious to the occidental mind are some of the ways of Arabia and other Mohammedan countries. A traveler says: "One of the objects of the most anxious solicitude for Mohammedan parents is the shielding of their children from the evil eye. Any person expressing admiration for a child except by phony ejaculation or the invocation of blessings upon the prophet fills the heart of the parent with apprehension. When children are to be taken into the street their faces are often even smeared with mud or greasy substances lest their comeliness should attract attention, and in order that the person of the child itself should escape attention gaudy and glittering ornaments are hung about it and written charms sewed into leather medallions suspended from its neck.
