Affairs of the Sporting World

Charles Comiskey is to buy permanent training grounds for the White Sox in Texas. They probably will be near El Paso and be used first in the spring of 1910.

Fred Merkle yesterday signed a contract for another year with the New York nationals. Merkle's contract contains an increase in salary. He also received a letter from Manager McGraw stating that he expected the Toledo player to do great things this season and that his fine work in 1908 entitled him to a raise.

As a result of having his foot frozen while attending a funeral some time ago Harry Schlafey is compelled to use a crutch in walking. Schlafey is signed to play with Newark of the Eastern league. Last season he was manager of the Toronto team.

Much regret is being expressed about New York by the announcement that Manager Stallings of the Yankees will not allow his men to play the Reds an ante-season series at Atlanta this coming spring. If the series were played it might show up either one of the teams which is largely the reason it will not be played.

Frank Bowman the manager of the Doves, and Roger Bresnahan, manager of the Cardinals are holding a conference in Detroit. The real purpose of the meeting is to dispose of George Browne, the right fielder of the Doves. He has declared that he will play out-law ball rather than play in Boston au-

ther year, and has suggested that he be let go to St. Louis, which Bowman will probably do today for a cash consideration.

"Chick" Fraser, one of the twirlers who aided in earning the title of world's champions for the Cubs, has placed himself in a position where he need not worry should destiny deprive him of working on the base ball diamond. "Chick" returned from Idaho, where he purchased a ranch, which when in proper order, will give off "ninety ton to the acre." Fraser has eighty acres and hopes to get more.

Lee Tannehill, the clever third baseman of the White Sox, has fully recovered his health, and says that he will play in his old time form the coming season. He hasn't been really himself for a couple of seasons, owing to injuries; but when he is right he compares favorably with any third corner man in the country. He has already signed his contract which makes the worries of President Comiskey one less as it was thought that Tan might give up the game this season.

Secretary Farrell's bulletin contains notice of the reinstatement of Thomas Dougherty, Clyde Robinson and Frank Roth of Milwaukee, and Hecklinger of Minneapolis. These players took part in games with ineligible players in Chicago. They applied for reinstatement to the national board, and notice of their reinstatement will be promulgated as soon as each comes up with a \$10 fine.
