These suits were obtained from government authorities at Indianapolis.

Band Was Feature.

"Poet and Peasant" and "Sounds from the Sunny South" were the other band selections and each was well received by the audience. coln Observance Held at
Springfield, Ill.

PLACE MEMORIAL TABLET

THE BRONZE ADORNS THE BUILD-
ING WHICH WAS LINCOLN'S
FIRST LAW OFFICE—WASH-
INGTON CELEBRATES.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 12.—Seldom has this city witnessed a more pretentious celebration than the Lincoln centennial program rendered here today. The city is in gay attire; lithographs and pictures and relics of Lincoln are everywhere to be seen. The ceremonies began this morning at nine, when the Grand Army Post planted an elm tree in the court house yard. Later the services were held at the Lincoln monument, followed by the dedication of a tablet in Lincoln's first law office. A church service and mass meeting this afternoon were held. The speakers included Senator Dulliver and William Jennings Bryan. A big banquet at the armory tonight will wind up the celebration.

WASHINGTON OBSERVES DAY.

Washington, Feb. 12.—Washington honored the memory of Lincoln by fitting ceremonies. The holiday was observed by all departments, schools, etc. Services were held in churches, clubs, and by patriotic societies. The Central Labor union will celebrate tonight.

TWO DEMOCRATS BALKY

MCCARTY AND TILDEN WILL RE-
FUSE TO SUPPORT THE BILL—
FOUR REPUBLICANS ARE SUP-
PORTING IT.

Indianapolis, Feb. 12.

It will probably be up to Lieutenant Governor Hall to cast the deciding vote on the Tomlinson bill in the senate. McCarty and Tilden (democrats) will vote against the bill, leaving twenty-one democrats for it. It is believed that Wood, Orndorf, Durre, Gonnerman, (republicans) will vote for the bill if the license be made a thousand dollars. This would make the vote stand 25 for and 25 against the passage. Hall would in this contingency vote aye and pass the bill. The bill will come to vote in the senate next week. There are fifty-one new bills in the house. None are important except one by Broley to repeal the intermediate sentence law. The house killed the Bloomfield court bill and advanced the Linton court bill to the third reading. It also engrossed the Hammond court bill and the bill for a separate circuit court in Howard county.

Against Steel Trust.

In the house today Strickland and Askren each introduced bills to repeal "Riparian rights act," passed two years ago. These measures are directed at the United States Steel

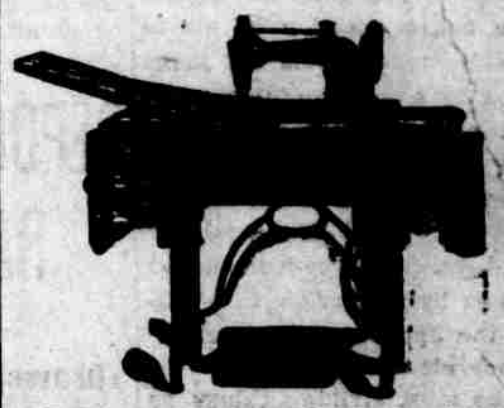

saloons to be established in the limits of police jurisdiction, four miles from city limits, on petition of a majority of the voters, and permits saloons in any outside township on petition of a majority of the voters and sends the bill back to the house without the amendments it is believed the house will agree to it, for it will then be the best it can get.

Senate Will Amend It.
But there are a good many persons who believe that the senate will

amend the Tomlinson bill so as to make the saloon license \$1,000 instead of the graded prices that it contains now, based on the classification of the cities and towns. Early in the session several of the republican senators, said they were willing to help repeal the county option law but that they would not do so unless a bill was presented that provided for high license. Senator Wood was one of these, and Wood has a lot of influence in the senate.
