WILL CUT SALARY  
FOR SENATOR KNOX

Speaker Cannon Has Promised to Push Action in The House, Monday.

## NO OPPOSITION EXPECTED

ACTION CONGRESS WILL TAKE WILL MAKE PENNSYLVANIA MAN ELIGIBLE FOR SECRETARY OF STATE JOB.

Washington, Feb. 13.—Unless Senator Philander C. Knox of Pennsylvania now slated for secretary of state in the cabinet of President Taft, should make up his mind suddenly to stay in the senate, the bill removing his present ineligibility to that office by reducing the salary from \$12,000 to \$8,000 a year will become a law by Tuesday of next week.

Arrangements for its speedy passage by the house are now complete, and on Monday Speaker Cannon and his lieutenants expect to put it through under suspension of the rules.

## Dodge Complications.

In order to avoid complicating the situation, which stands unique in the history of the country, the speaker has ignored the committee on judiciary, to which the bill which passed the senate, would be referred under ordinary circumstances, was assigned to the committee on the election of president, vice-president, etc., the duty of reporting a similar measure.

Representative Gaines of West Virginia, the chairman, responded quickly to the call, and a bill he had drafted follows the line of the one which already has passed the senate, but which is now lying on the speaker's table in order to avoid a reference to the judiciary committee with its accompanying embarrassments.

## Taft Takes a Hand.

The reason the latter committee is being ignored in this way was that its chairman, Representative Jenkins of Wisconsin, and several other members of it are opposed to this method of circumventing the constitution in order to clear the way for the Pennsylvania senator to go to the cabinet.

Although the president elect has injected his personality into the situation, the opponents to the procedure described intend to discuss the proposition when it is submitted to the house next week. But as previously stated the bill seems quite certain to receive a large majority when it is put upon its passage. The interest which Judge Taft has taken in the case is responsible for a decided change in sentiment in the house, which became apparent this afternoon. The president elect has sent duplicate telegrams to Speaker Cannon and Senator Hale, urging the enactment of legislation similar to that passed by the senate, and expressing the opinion that it would remove Senator Knox's disqualification to enter the cabinet.
