## THE DETAILS ARE LACKING

CABAL CAME OUT THROUGH THE  
DEATH OF GRAND DUKE VLADIMIR—REGENCY WAS TO BE ESTABLISHED.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 19.—According to an anonymous statement published here today a sensational plot has been discovered, having for its object the dethronement of Czar Nicholas. Details are lacking further than that the regency was to be established and the cabal came out through death of Grand Duke Vladimir, eldest uncle of the emperor.
