FIFTEEN FROM HERE

Went to Attend Inaugural Ceremonies at Washington And See the Sights.

FRED BAYER TO PARADE

Although the travel to Washington would indicate that there would be a larger crowd at the inauguration tomorrow than ever before, there will be few local persons present according to railroad ticket agents. Altogether, there have been 15 tickets sold by the local agents. Included in the list of those who had left up till noon today, are Miss Elsie Marshall of Earlham College, Mrs. T. J. Ferguson, Ed McNally, George Dilka, P. J. Freeman, Chris Hasemeier, W. H. Romey, Russell Gaar, George and Fred Bayer. Fred Bayer will be the only local person in the parade unless George Conrad accepts an invitation. Young Bayer is a student of Miami Military academy and will be in the troops from this school, which will lead the parade. The travel from the west just at the present time is very heavy and extra coaches have been put on certain eastbound trains to accommodate it. The destination of nearly every passenger, according to the conductors, is Washington.

WAS IRISH VETERAN

Aged Man in Police Court Stated He Had Bled for the Great Republic.

HE IS ALSO A HORSEMAN.

"I'm Jerry Sheehy, I'm seventy-six years old, I was born in Ireland but fought for your country in '63, '64 and '65. I spent six months in Andersonville prison. I want to go to Piquette, Ohio to get work and go from there to Columbus to get my honorable discharge. I took care of one mare that trotted 1,400 tests to a high wheel sulky in 2:13 1/4 or better. I have trained a lot of fine horses." Such was the response of Jerry when asked as to his identity in city court this afternoon. He, too, said he came from Cambridge City. He was picked up on the street last night by Officer Hebble. He wanted to tell the judge a whole lot more about himself, but was finally suppressed. The judge said it all would be interesting no doubt, but he could not hear it at the time. Sheehy was placed aboard an interurban car and started east to spend his 20 cents.

CLAIM STRUCTURE NEEDED
