In a game devoid of interest except as to the size of the score, the local high school team swamped the Liberty high school players by the score of 54 to 4 last evening at the Y. M. C. A. gym. The visitors seemed to be about as well acquainted with the game of basketball as a mouse would be with a K. of P. watch bob. They never had a look in. The four points scored came as the result of throws from the foul line, as not a field goal was scored. It was so easy for the locals as to be really farcical.

Brown Had It Easy.

Brown had all the fruit at center and securing the ball on every jump he passed it about the floor or to a forward without trouble. A goal would result and then the trip would have to be made again. The score simply was a question of the length of halves. If time had permitted it might as well have been 100 for all the opposition the Liberty boys presented.

Of course there is consolation for the defeated ones. They have not been coached in the game like the locals and have not had the opportunity to play. They were outclassed. The locals had experienced the kind of sensation themselves during the present season and although they knew how to sympathize, none had fallen them, so they were disposing of none. They had visions of a continuous procession of country cousins coming from near and far to the wet metropolis for their weekly supply of "booze," and incidentally dropping their surplus coin into the coffers of the merchants in other lines also.

Quigley Premier Rush of League

Richmond Player Makes Splendid Record With The Marion Outfit.

SHARPE'S GOOD SHOWING

LITTLE RUSH OF QUAKER TEAM UP WITH THE TOP-NOTCHERS—HICKEY OF ANDERSON LEADS GOALTENDS.

Anderson, Ind., March 13.—The polo dope for the season to date shows up a few things not generally noticed from game to game. Marion's rusher, L. Quigley, seems to be the premier of all rushers, while Perry takes off the honor of committing the most fouls. Anderson's goal tend has a stop or two more to his credit than the others, and Hubbard has the most goals to his credit for halfback.

Williams of Elwood, is a close second in goal getting, with H. Abel third. The Marion rushers seem to work best together, but can't chalk up goals enough to win. Elwood depends entirely on Williams to win his games, while Sampson and Nolan have been working nicely for New Castle. Richmond has played in poor luck with the stock of players to pick from, but Sharpe is holding his own with most of them. The continual changing of men on the different teams tends to make records impossible, and none have been made to date.

Several over time games have been played, the longest of which was the Anderson-Elwood game of 21 minutes.

Wilson has the record for the most stops in a 45-minute game with 51, while Hickey has the most stops in a game, with 64.

Elwood has made 74 goals; Marion 54; New Castle 56; Richmond 63; Anderson 68; Marion 22 fouls; Anderson 30; Elwood 13; Richmond 19, and New Castle 13.

Marion has won 133 rushes; New Castle, 77; Anderson, 75; Elwood, 63, and Richmond 49.

The most fouls against any one team in a single game has been 5, and the smallest score was 1 to 0.
