Washington, March 18.—At the opening of the house session this morning Chairman Payne requested and was granted permission to report back to the house from the ways and means committee the new tariff bill, with a favorable report for its adoption. Thirty thousand copies were ordered printed. Representative Crumpacker asked the unanimous consent for the consideration of the pension bill. The house then took a recess to allow the committee on rules to prepare a specific order as to the census bill.

Taft in New York.
New York, March 18.—President Taft and his party arrived at noon to attend the Cleveland memorial services at Carnegie hall. The president was well guarded. A large crowd was at the ferry station.

**KING ACQUITTED
ON LIQUOR CHARGE**

**Testimony Against Him Was
Not Sufficient.**

In city court this afternoon a bench warrant was made to convict Harry King of the charge of selling whiskey on Sunday, and selling without a license. Frank Helmick, who disappeared after the city after his arrest as the purchasing witness, returned yesterday and this afternoon appeared in court. He claimed he was not under the influence of liquor (used for a bad cold) Sunday, that he is not able to remember what happened. He was ordered by the court several times to tell of the incident exactly as it occurred. He deviated repeatedly and his falling testimony became a matter that elicited a rebuke from the court.

Supt. Bailey and Patrolmen Longman and Bundy testified that Helmick told them he secured the liquor from King. Helmick refused to make this kind of a statement in court and said he had to be acquitted.
