Former Department Member
Given Appointment by
Board Today.

MORE HOSE IS ORDERED

AT SESSION OF THE BOARD MANY
PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS, UNDER
NEW LAW'S TERMS, HAVE
BEEN ORDERED.

William Mills was appointed substitute fireman at a meeting of the board of public works today. Mills was a member of the department some time ago and resigned. He begins his duties April 1. The board also ordered the purchase of 200 feet of chemical hose and new linoleum for the floor of the bed rooms of the city hall department. This improvement has been needed badly for some time.

The board ordered the installation of water main in South West Sixth street from D to E streets and in Linden avenue from Hunt to Ridge streets. The resolution providing for the opening of South Seventh street from J to L streets, was rescinded. The improvement was re-monstrated against and the board finally decided it unnecessary.

Resolutions were ordered prepared for cement sidewalks on both sides of Eighth street from Main to E and cement sidewalks, curbs and gutters from E to H streets. In places where good cement walks, or star brick walks now are laid, these will be accepted. A resolution for cement walks, curbs and gutters on both sides of South Eleventh from C to E streets, was ordered prepared.

Resolutions were ordered prepared for the following improvements, which had been passed before, but upon which action had to be taken again, in accord with the provisions of the new law governing public improvements, were passed: West Second street, Kinsey south to the corporation limits; cement roadway in alley between Ninth and Tenth, Main and North A streets.

Cement curbs and gutters south fourteenth from C to E streets, both sides. Alley between West Main and Kinsey, Third and Fifth streets. Cement walks both sides North A street, Fifth to Seventh. Cement walks both sides North Sixth Main street to Fort Wayne avenue. Sewer between South First, Third, A and B streets.

Construction of South D street, Fourteenth to Fifteenth, cement curbs and gravel walks. South Seventh street, B to H, cement curbs and gutters.
