NEMESIS GETS A WEALTHY TEXAN; A MURDER CHARGE

Alleged That Thirty-two Years Ago When Living in Indiana He Killed the Girl He Loved.

BURNHAM WAS THEN MERELY FARM HAND

Girl's Throat Was Cut, It Is Alleged, in a Jealous Rage, And Her Home Then Burned To Ground.

Terre Haute, Ind., March 31.—Thirty-two years after the violent death of his sweetheart, a man, said to be Sylvanus Burnham, is to be brought back from Texas, charged with murder. The accused is now respected, wealthy and the head of a family. A generation ago the man with whose identity he is linked was a farm laborer, and unwelcome suitor for the hand of the girl whose killing was the sequel of her jealous lover's anger.

A Terre Haute excursionist to Texas recently saw the man now accused of the murder of Rosa Tritt near this city thirty-two years ago, and, since the night of the tragedy, untraced, so far as known.

Yesterday a requisition was issued by the governor of Indiana to the governor of Texas. A warrant was sent to Texas last Saturday and an arrest is hourly expected, but the authorities will not give the location. The man, known here as Burnham, is said to reside near a city on a ranch.

Sylvanus Burnham, in other days, was employed as a farm hand by Burgoyne Tritt. Rose Tritt, a granddaughter whose parents were dead, lived with her grandfather, and Burnham was pressing unacceptable attentions on her.

Jealousy Sows Seeds of Crime.

She had a sweetheart, a young farmer of the neighborhood, and Burnham was jealous. After a call by the young farmer one night, Burnham upbraided the 19 year old girl and, it is said, declared if she didn't bid the rival discontinue his visits her life would pay the penalty.

One Sunday night the Tritt homestead was burned and in the ruins the body of the girl was found with her throat cut. She had been murdered in bed, apparently, and the body rolled in a length of carpet before the dwelling was fired. Her grandparents had escaped the flames and Burnham had disappeared.

It is said he entered the navy and served seven years, after which he went to Texas.

If Burnham has ever communicated with anyone in Terre Haute the fact is not commonly known. There are some things that indicate he has, such as the disappearance from the files of the daily newspapers in the public library and which are the only ones in existence covering the period of the murder, of the particular copy containing an account of the crime.

Evidence Obliterated by Time. The officers were annoyed yesterday because of their movements becoming public, as they feared their quarry might scent danger and flee. Yet they doubted that the man would leave all his property and surroundings in Texas to become a fugitive from justice rather than make a fight, for which he has ample resources.

Wesley Brown, of the firm Brown, Darnell & Co., is confined to his home with lung trouble. His recovery is very slow.

HARRIMAN WOULD FAVOR A MERGER OF ALL RAILROADS

The Great Railroad Magnate Would Like to Combine all Roads and Spend \$250,000,000 on Them.

DELIVERS ADDRESS TO DENVER, COL., MEN

Wizard States That Time Will Prove That Roosevelt Was Wrong in Making His Great Crusade.

Denver, Colo., March 31.—W. E. H. Harriman could have his way he would bring all the railroads of America into one gigantic combination, under one head, and begin immediately spending \$250,000,000 or \$300,000,000 on improvements of the weaker roads, both physically and financially.

In this way, he says, he believes he could do the greatest good for the government, the people generally, to the shippers individually, and, finally, to the owners of railroad stocks.

Mr. Harriman, who passed two hours in Denver on his way East, said in an informal talk at the chamber of commerce:

"If we could we would throw our cloak over the weaker lines throughout the country and begin immediately the expenditure of between \$250,000,000 and \$300,000,000 to improve them."

"It ought to be done immediately and I think I can qualify as an expert on these matters. This should be done openly and under some sort of government supervision. But we would all be put in prison if we tried it."

Spent \$350,000,000 Since 1902.

Mr. Harriman declared that his roads have spent about \$350,000,000 since 1902, building and rebuilding in the west and through the mountains. He repeated his assertion that he had found a great change in public sentiment toward railroads and railroad building throughout the land.

"Five years ago," he said, "I told President Roosevelt that he was wrong and that he would have many imitators in various states and cities who would do the country incalculable harm, and what I told him then has proved correct. Roosevelt was wrong in his fight on me and the railroads, and the truth of this is getting clearer every day."

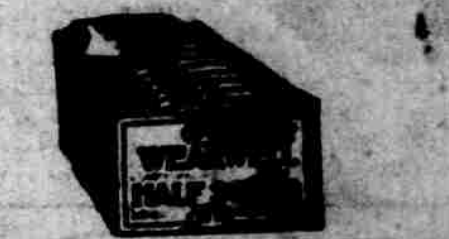

In her report to the circuit court, Mrs. Candler said Wislon left the state and left his children in a state of neglect so that they were public charges. SONS OF DANIEL BOONE IN FIELD

Twenty Thousand Lads Will Search for a Kidnaped "Fellow Scout."

A BIG REWARD IS OFFERED

YOUNG BROTHER OF THE MISSING LAD APPEALS TO THE SOCIETY TO RENDER HIM ASSISTANCE.

New York, March 31.—Twenty thousand and American boys, all members of a social and athletic organization known as the Sons of Daniel Boone, have enlisted in the task of running down the kidnaper of one of their number, Harold Moon, a member of the Flint, Mich., chapter of the organization.

Already there have been offered rewards aggregating \$1,300 for the return of the boy, who disappeared on Feb. 27, to his parents, but so far no trace of him has been found.

The aid of the Sons of Daniel Boone was invoked by Ralph Moon, a brother of the kidnaped boy, in a letter of appeal sent to every chapter of the organization in America.

"Please get right to work and hustle," urges the boy in his letter, "for the honor of our great society and to help a fellow scout who is in the hands of the enemy."
