

## NEW CHICAGO" BRANDED A FAKE

Palmer, Tex., Visitor Makes  
Charge Against a Land  
Company.

SAYS IT EXISTS ON PAPER

PROMOTERS HAD DISPLAY CAR  
IN RICHMOND FOR TWO WEEKS  
RECENTLY AND SEVERAL PEOPLES  
BUY LAND.

"New Chicago," the Texas town exploited by the Giant Construction company, of Chicago, which kept a car with a display in this city for two weeks and sought to interest local residents to invest in land, is branded as a fake by The Palestine Daily Visitor, a newspaper printed at Palestine, Texas. The town is in Anderson county, the same county in which the advertisements of the Giant Construction company said "New Chicago" is to be found. When the car was in this city, the agents made an alluring offer and it is probable induced several local persons to invest.

What Paper Says.  
The Palestine Visitor says of the company and its project:

Every few days we receive a communication from some one in the northern states who has been humbugged into buying a lot in "New Chicago," a town that has its only existence on paper.

A friend called our attention to this matter yesterday and handed us a booklet, beautifully gotten up and printed in colors, backed with the title, "New Chicago," and the worst thing about it is that it is partly true. Tommyson's Grand-Mother said: "A lie that is half the truth, is the meanest lie of all," or something like that, and so it is—you don't know where to meet such falsehood. The book is full of misleading pictures and statements, and if the fool-killer were not abroad in the land would deceive no one.

With this book are copies of the contracts of the "Giant Construction Co. of Chicago" for sale of town lot in New Chicago and ten acres of land with each lot.

Get Many Letters.

There are numerous letters to and from parties who have purchased, from which it appears that the company had sold up to Nov. 1908, about 2,512 lots, the purchase price being \$10.00 down and \$10.00 for 18 ensuing months—thus realizing on first money \$25.130 and a like sum each succeeding month.

Now to furnish each of these purchasers with a lot and ten acres of ground, would take \$5,130 acres of land beside the land for the town-site.

As the Giant Construction Co., managed by Mr. S. A. Buffington of Chicago, has only purchased somewhere near 1,500 acres of land in this county we would like to know how they will make it go around.

A great many people have been induced to come here through this scheme and while many are greatly pleased with the climate and country and see the possibilities offering here for cheap homes, many are bitterly disappointed at the humbug put off upon them.

There is no such town as New Chicago, and it is the duty of every honest person to let this fact be known and stop this "giant" imposition on the too credulous who are seeking homes in Texas.

Local Educators Leave for  
Capital to Attend State  
Meeting.

The majority of the Richmond teachers who will attend the meetings of the Northern and Southern Indiana Teachers' association at Indianapolis April 1, 2 and 3, left early this morning. A few wanted to be on the ground early, so they left last evening.

Headquarters for the teachers were opened yesterday in the hotel Denison. Preparations to entertain about 6,000 teachers have been made by the two associations. The available hotel accommodations have been spoken for and it is probable that additional rooms will have to be secured in the Y. W. C. A. building and private residences for the late arrivals.

The local schools closed last evening. The two days' vacation added to the regular Saturday and Sunday vacation appeals to the students very much, as it will be the only vacation during the spring term.

Is of Great Merit.

The two teachers' associations are holding their meetings at the same time this year, as it is believed by the educators that it is more advisable. The Southern association will meet in the Caleb Mills Hall and the Northern association in Tomlinson Hall.

Ralston of Lebanon, and Annie Fellows Johnston, author of "The Little Colonel," series of stories for girls.
